scores ever year: Battle Creek, Conestoga, Črofton, Perkins County, Southern Valley, Superior and Tekamah-Herman.

The reading assessment tests have been in place for three years; the math assessment has two years of results and science is just getting started with only one year of testing.

'We are very proud of our students," said English teacher Roxie Pier. "In today's world with so many distractions competing for their time and attention, we still have many students who absolutely love to read."

She notices more and more students carrying their library books with them in their book bags, close at hand, so if there are a few empty moments while waiting for others to finish a quiz or homework, they can read a few pages.

The reading program has deep roots in the Crofton District. Twenty years ago, then-principal Dick Allen, Justin Bossman, Lisa Nissen and Pier started the Outside Reading program in Crofton High School. Pier remembers students and parents fighting the program, but today it is an accepted part of the English curriculum. The program now also includes Crofton Elementary and St. Rose so the reading requirements are all part of a day at school.

Today the students read not only books in English class but also in all subject areas – even Physical Education where Rod Hegge requires the students to read health and sport biography books.

"It indicates the great amount of importance the staff and students place on working to adhere to higher standards," said Supt. Randy Anderson. "I compliment everyone for the really good relationships between teaching staff and students, which have been developed in our district."

Students know Pier will accommodate them year-round when reading tests need to be taken. Many students read in the summer months and make appointments to take the required tests after weight-lifting on a summer weekday.

"I remember Mr. Allen telling me all those years ago, not to lose sleep over those students who don't want to read," said Pier. "Just think of those who are improving their skills, even if it is just a little.

Each student must read four books a year and even if they don't like to read, it's not such a huge hurdle to overcome.

Pier knows the students feel they are harassed about reading but it's okay with her. One morning last fall she stopped at the gas station before school and ran into several CHS alumni from nearly 10 years ago.

"As I walked past their vehito me, 'We're reading ... we're

reading!" said Pier with a wide

A gab session in Pier's classroom with a few students pulled in out of the hallway over noon break revealed a few of the students thoughts on this noteworthy occasion. Several new books were added to the library this year and the students were quite pleased with the variety.

'The teachers really make reading and books fun," said Bridget Arens. "They recommend books which they think we will enjoy." The students also like it when Mrs. Pier talks to them about books they have read.

"I like the excitement Mrs. Pier brings to reading; she makes it more interesting and actually asks what part we like and what our thoughts are," said Quinn Wragge. Šhe has actually read the books and knows what the students are talking about when they can't put the book down.

For me, it fills free time in school," said Max David.

Some students like series of book or vampire themes. Then there are teachers like social science teacher Mitch Hofer who keeps newspapers and current event magazines in front of the students, encouraging them to use their reading skills in this area. He also has classic novels like "1984" and makes recommendations about books from earlier eras which have themes that are timeless and educational as well.

"I wouldn't know to read a age me," said David.

"I really appreciate the teachers encouraging us to read books, all kinds – it widens our horizons," said Taylor Johnson. He looks for murder and suspense novels - anything to keep him in suspense.

Some students like Cole Steffen love to read about history in action and historical fiction. The interests are as varied as the students themselves. There was one brave student. Lane Weidner. who sat not three feet from Mrs. Pier's desk and said he would read anything as long as it wasn't Shakespeare. We are proud of the achieve-

ments of our students as indicated by the governor's rankings. It gives us a reason to celebrate,' said secondary principal Todd Strom. "The students of Crofton have a strong desire to learn and excel. The faculty is knowledgeable in their content and are skilled instructional leaders. The high expectations and support of parents along with learning goals set by teachers and students make our school very conducive to learning. The entire school community supports each other and strives to live up to the high standards needed for kids to be 21st century learners. It is a great day to be a Warrior!"
