# Sophia's War' Is Riveting Novel


Have you ever had a really big secret? One that you knew you needed to tell someone, but no one would believe you?

Twelve-year-old Sophia Calderwood's world has turned upside-down. Her beloved brother has joined the Patriot army fighting for America's freedom from Britain. How proud she is of him! How certain she is that the Patriots will prevail over the British Redcoats! If only they would hear from William to know that he is

So far she's been spared the ugliness of war, until the day she sees Nathan Hale hanged for being a spy. Such a horrible event cements her hatred and fear of British soldiers. Her father being wounded by the British as he tries to return from the country to their house in New York City adds to those feeling even further. So when her family is told that a British officer will be staying with them Sophia is horrified.

To her great surprise, Lt. John Andre is nothing like she expected. He is polite, respectful and charming. In no time it seems to Sophia that Lt. Andre fancies her. She dismisses the age difference

She and her parents are careful not to mention William to Lt. Andre. Sophia manages to keep quiet until the day she and Lt. Andre are walking along the street. A group of ragged Pa-



triot prisoners is being moved to prison by British soldiers. And among them, looking terrible, is her precious William. Unable to keep quiet, she calls out to him. With that, their se-

Luckily, Lt. Andre says he will tell no one about William. This gives Sophia's father the courage to ask Lt. Andre if he can help free William from prison. But he tells Sophia and his family that he cannot help William, as he will do nothing to tarnish his standing as a British officer. He is also being transferred to another loca-

Sophia tries to save William by herself. She is able to bribe her way into prison to see him once. The next time, she learns he has died. Sophia vows revenge against the British armv.

Three years later, the war is still stretching on. Then Sophia meets a man who asks if she'd be willing to learn information about the British army and pass it on to him. Remembering her vow to William, she says yes. She's placed as a serving girl in a high-ranking British officer's home. To her great surprise that high-ranking official is John Andre, now a major. Luckily she's changed enough that he doesn't recognize

Sophia is able to pick up bits and pieces of information, dutifully passing them on. Then her contact tells her he must drop out of sight. Sophia is on her own. And she's piecing together information that indicates a very high Patriot officer will become a traitor. But her contact is gone. If she does nothing and is right about what she's learned, the Patriot cause will be over. She's the only one who can do anything. But what can a 15-year-old girl do?

This historical fiction book, for ages 8 and up, is riveting and educational, as it is based on true events and true people, except for Sophia and her family, who are fictional. It's well worth curling up with this winter. And don't keep it a secret — pass the book along.


