## Yankton Post Office Auction Closed

The Internet auction for the former downtown Yankton Post Office has closed. According to the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) auction page, bidding ended at 10 a.m. Wednesday with a high bid of \$206,000. The U.S. Postal Service will now take time to evaluate the bid before accepting it. According to the GSA website: "At the

close of the auction, the high bid will be considered for acceptance by the government. The government reserves the right to reject any or all bids for any reason." Bidders on the post office were only identified by a number. An initial bid of \$15,000 was submitted Nov. 4 and bidding remained steady for a month. Earlier this week, bidding intervals were reduced from 24 hours to two hours from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. during the work week.

The final bid, submitted by "Bidder #10," was received at 10:32 p.m. Monday. The downtown Yankton post office was closed in January 2012 and put up for sale. Postal operations were consolidated into the annex at 506 West 25th Street. That facility was built in 2000. You can follow Nathan Johnson on Twitter at twitter.com/AnInlandVoyage. ion in 1943. It served as a place of worship for the more than 70,000 troops stationed near Rockhampton, Central Queensland, Australia, during the war. Yeppoon is located a short distance from Rockhampton. Morris managed to track down two surviving veterans and the families of the seven men who had passed away. "Searching for those men in the chapel ... the odds seemed impossible, but it was extremely satisfying when I found them, and the families' appreciation made it very rewarding," he said. Faced with a new pair of mysteries, Morris said he first contacted the Americans who helped him find information about the aforementioned nine veterans. While the dog tag has specific facts regarding the owner, the ring bears little indication of who owned it. "The only marking on the ring is the manufacturer's name — 'Moody Bros Los Angeles,'" Morris said. "But the crest on one side of the ring has been confirmed as that of the 147th South Dakota National Guard Field Artillery." That's what led Morris to believe the ring belonged to a South Dakota National Guard member who was stationed in Australia during World War II. Sonja Johnson, director of the South Dakota National Guard Museum in Pierre, was able to identify the insignia via a photograph after being contacted by Morris. "We've never seen anything like (this ring)," she told the Press & Dakotan Thursday. "We don't have any photographs

that we can blow up enough to see who has rings on and who doesn't, so we weren't able to assist him with finding the owner. Other than identifying that it has the 147th Field Artillery insignia on the side of it, I wasn't able to provide any more information." While hopeful that Morris is successful in finding the owner, Johnson acknowledged it will be difficult. "We don't have many World War II vets left," she said. If the owner or a descendant isn't found, Johnson said she "would be very interested in having the ring at the museum." Morris has already discovered the daughter of the dog tag owner, and he said it should reach her today (Friday). The veteran in question was Edward Chester Marberry, who was born Nov. 22, 1915, in San Bernardino, Calif. After World War II, he served in Korea and attained the rank of lieutenant colonel. Marberry went on to a long career with General Motors and died Sept. 7, 1994, at the age of 78. Morris spent the last 20 years of his working life as a ranger skipper operating patrol boats in the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park. He retired in 1996. During World War II, he lived in the small town of Emu Park, which is midway between Yep-

poon and Keppel Sands. "I could see the daily flotilla of U.S. Army (tank landing ships) and (amphibious tanks) working practice landings on Great Keppel Island and hear the explosions of the 75-millimeter field guns practice shelling Split Rock off Keppel Sands," Morris said, noting that he believes the field artillery unit was the 147th. "My generation has not forgotten the sacrifice these men made defending this country in 1942." In Darwin, Northern Territory, Australia, a plaque in Bicentennial Park commemorates the service of the 147th. It reads: "This Field Artillery regiment first landed at Brisbane on December 23, 1941. It was quickly sent to Darwin, N.T., to serve under the command of the Commanding General Australian Forces for the defense of the Darwin area. The first American flag to be flown over a U.S. encampment in Australia was raised on January 18, 1942. Troops of the 147th F.A. were widely dispersed into defensive positions both on the coast and inland, when on February 19,

1942, a substantial bombing raid by the Japanese Naval Carrier Force caused immense damage to Darwin and all of the ships in the harbor. Erected in February, 1992 by the 147th F.A. World War II veterans." Despite the long odds of solving this final mystery, Morris remains optimistic. "I am hopeful that the owner or a descendant will be found," he said. "I like the old U.S. armed forces slogan: 'The difficult we do immediately; the impossible takes a little longer.'" Anyone with information about the ring can reach Morris at morrispb@tadaust.org.au.
