# **USD Teams Prep For Trek West**

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It's one thing to move a football or a women's basketball game to Sioux Falls, an hour from Vermillion.

We're playing in what is primarily a hockey rink, so they're not likely to have basketballs," said Bandy, who estimated his personal checklist of things to look

trative staff traveled to Rapid City in October to finalize logistics, Bandy said, particularly with on-site details such as team locker rooms, officials and scorer's table staff.

The idea of taking basketball West River was originally proposed by former athletic director David Sayler, according to Bandy.

"One way to do that is, 'Why not playing a double-header in Rapid City?'" Bandy

ORU was a member of The Summit League from 1997-2012 and has continued to compete as an affiliate member in men's soccer each of the past two years.

The Presidents Council unanimously supported Oral Roberts University's return to The Summit League," said Dr. Dean L. Bresciani, North Dakota State University President and Chair of The Summit League's Presidents Council. "It is an indication of the enthusiasm the council has for the opportunity to enhance our membership."

During its 15 years in the

league, the Golden Eagles won nine Commissioner Cups, awarded to the league's top overall athletics program, 91 league championships and 49 regular season crowns.

"ORU is excited about returning to The Summit League and its distinguished member institutions," said Oral Roberts University Director of Athletics Mike Carter. "We look forward to renewing the rivalries we developed during our 15 years in the conference and to continuing the proud tradition of The Summit League.'

The ORU men's basketball program captured three consecutive Summit League Tournament titles from 2006-08 and won or shared six regular season championships. The Golden Eagles won 15 consecutive Summit League women's golf championships and 15 straight baseball tournament championships, the top two team streaks in league history.

A pair of ORU athletes combined to win three individual NCAA Track and Field Championships for The Summit League over the past decade. In 2008, Andretti Bain won both the Indoor and Outdoor 400-meter Championships. Four years later, Jack Whitt won the NCAA Outdoor Pole Vault Championship.

Founded in 1963, Oral Roberts University has an enrollment of 3,403 and offers more than 60 undergraduate majors, as well as 13 master's-level programs and two doctoral degrees. Based in Tulsa, Okla., ORU becomes the fourth Summit League institution located in top 60 U.S. metro populations.

## **Coyotes Power Past Utah State**

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VERMILLION — On a night where the home team was pushing the pace against an aggressive defense, Margaret McCloud consistently found herself in the right spot.

And the sophomore from Rapid City delivered.

Keyed by McCloud's double-double of 18 points and 10 rebounds, the University of South Dakota women surged past Utah State 81-71 in Thursday night's foul-filled affair at the DakotaDome.

'We worked a lot on quick movements, trying to include everyone in the offense, getting the ball moving as fast as we can," said McCloud, who was on the court for 18 min-

"We had those good shots and knocked them down."

Especially after halftime. Playing their third consecutive home against a Mountain West Conference foe, the Coyotes (4-5) practically lived at the foul line in the second half and helped themselves by shooting 50 percent. USD finished 27-of-44 at

the charity stripe.

A big part of drawing fouls was fighting through Utah State's trap — the so-called

'buzz' defense. "Their defense is very aggressive, always trapping, scrap and claw, but if you attack, you can get to the foul line, and we did a great job," Coyote head coach Amy

Williams said. The Covotes were also effective down low, getting a combined 34 points from posts McCloud and Polly Har-

rington (16). "She always gets in the right gaps," said junior Nicole Seekamp, who finished with 20 points, nine assists and seven rebounds. "I feel like I can throw the ball pretty much wherever and she'll go

"Tonight she got in the open spots, and with that defense, we picked them apart through it.'

From a 50-50 tie midway through the second half, the Coyotes took control — at one point going on an 11-1

USD's largest lead was 14, with about the only point of criticism for the victors were 17 missed free throws.

"That's one of our strengths, we're a driving team," Seekamp said. "If we can get to the line that many times, obviously we should be making a bit more than that, but to get to the line 44 times is a great feat.'

Utah State point guard Jennifer Schlott scored 18 of her game-high 25 points to help Aggies lead 39-35 at halftime — despite trailing by

seven midway through.
The native of Mesa, Ariz., though, scored her points on a 10-of-30 effort from the field, which was a small victory for the Coyotes, Williams said.

"It may sound a little unusual to say we had a great defensive effort on a kid that got 27 points," Williams said, but I really felt like we did a better job in the second half of defending her without foul-

ing."
Tia Hemiller, Heidi Hoff and Bridget Arens all added six points for USD, which recorded 19 assists on 25 field goals.

Up next for the Coyotes is the trip to Rapid City for Saturday's showdown with former assistant coach Ryan Larsen, now at South Dakota School of Mines.

Football: Runner-Up Roosevelt Claims Eight Spots On Elite List

Caden Quintanilla grabbed most of the headlines after a stellar season in which he rushed for 1,893 yards and 29 touchdowns, leading the Lincoln Patriots to an undefeated season and a Class 11AAA championship.

But the big boys up front paved the way for Lincoln's historic season, which explains why four offensive linemen landed on this year's all-state squad, chosen by the South Dakota Football Coaches Association. In all, the Patriots placed nine players on the all-state

"Games are won and lost in the whose team defeated Roosevelt 47-24 in

Senior center Levi Rozeboom set the tone for the Patriots (11-0), anchoring the offensive unit as team captain and leading a unit that averaged 275 rushing yards a game.

"He's one of the best I've ever

Pats Put Nine On 11AAA All-State Squad coached," said Beavers. "Levi is a very smart player who handled a lot of our line checks and was very good at it."

Rozeboom is joined on the all-state team by senior offensive tackle Mike VanVeldhuizen and junior guard Drew Peters, while senior Caleb Rector made the squad as a long snapper.

They helped clear the path for Quintanilla, who ran for 244 yards and four touchdowns in the state finals and was named Argus Leader Elite 45 captain as well as Gatorade Player of the Year for South Dakota.

'He's the best running back and the hardest worker I've ever coached," said Beavers of Quintanilla, who finished with 3,733 rushing yards for his career.

Representing Lincoln on defense are end Reid West (45 tackles, 5.5 sacks), linebacker Matt Wagner (team-high 66 tackles, 12 for loss) and defensive backs Trevor Naasz (36 tackles, two interceptions) and Levi Foss (35 tackles, five INTs).

Wagner, also a key blocking back on offense, was the heart and soul of the Patriots for much of their rise to promi-

"He was one of only two two-way players for us (Naasz was the other), and he hardly ever left the field," said Beavers of Wagner. "He's a complete football player who knew what everyone needed to be doing on the field.

The all-state quarterback is junior Taryn Christion of Roosevelt, who passed for 2,549 yards and 24 touchdowns to lead the Rough Riders (9-2) to

the state championship game. For his career, Christion has thrown for 3,880 yards, rushed for 1,601 and accounted for 64 touchdowns while emerging as one of the most dynamic offensive players in the state.

Taryn is a great playmaker and one of the best athletes at quarterback ever at Roosevelt," said Riders coach Kim Nelson.

One of Christion's favorite targets was all-state tight end Tanner Hennings, who caught 27 passes for 477 yards (17.7 yards per catch) and five touch-

Also representing Roosevelt are guard Justin Haffield, defensive end Kory Lindquist (43 tackles, 11 sacks), defensive tackle Skylar Newberg, linebacker Kirby Hora (63 tackles), defensive back Austin Atwood and kicker Chase Vinatieri.

Sioux Falls teams claimed 18 of the available 28 spots on the all-state squad. Brandon Valley, which earned a share of the ESD title, is represented by wide receiver A.J. Garrow, offensive tackle Erik Ode, punter Devan West and

special teams player Cam Holmes. Washington is represented by senior linebacker Dan Marlette, a two-time allstate selection who racked up 70 tackles for the Warriors in 2013.
