The Bearcats won back-to-back national titles in 1998 and '99 and added a third title in 2009 that capped an unprecedented run of five national championship game appearances that began in 2005. The 1998 team was the first NCAA Division Il team ever to go 15-0. The Bearcats won 12 conference titles in Tjeerdsma's last 15 seasons and they went to the playoffs 13 of the last 15 seasons.

Theeler, who transferred to USD from the University of Minnesota, held 12 school records and two NCC marks when he left, finishing with a then-school record 21.5 points per game (1,573 points).
