Mustangs Shut Down MMC

The Morningside College Mustangs women's basketball team shut down the Mount Marty College Lancers holding a 30-point lead to win 79-51 Wednesday.

The young Mount Marty College team was unable to overcome the play pressure that Morningside created. After making too many mistakes on possessions in the first half the Lancers could not recover from the 30-point deficit and the Mustangs took

"We had a lot of kids that didn't handle presure well, we had a lot of kids that didn't make themselves available, getting themselves open," Mount Marty coach Tom Schlimgen said. "(Morningside's) scheme is different than what we've seen so far and we tried to prepare them for that, but obviously we didn't do a very good job of being available for passes and moving the basketball.

In the win for the Mustangs, MaKayla Augustine led the team with 13 points. Jessica Tietz had 12 points and made seven rebounds. Mandy Osborne was also a lead scorer for the Mustangs with 10 points.

Also for the Mustangs, Lexi Ackerman had six assists. Leann Osten and Ashlynn Muhl both grabbed five

For the Lancers, Logan Wagner was the lead scorer with 12 points, Cassidy Gebhart had five assists and Allison De Kam had five rebounds.

In the first half Morningside quickly applied presure with man-on-man defense keeping the Lancers from scoring in the first four minutes of the game 4-2.

We knew that we had a little bit of size on them and we were hoping that they would struggle a little, and to be honest the lid was on the basket for them," Morningside coach Jamie Sale siad.

The Lancers were unable to capatalize on possessions in the fast-paced game as a

steal by Morningside's Muhl allowed for a three increasing the Mustangs lead 19-6.

After a quick Mount Marty time out, both teams had two consecutive three-point baskets. Efforts by Morningside's Augustine, Tietz and Osborne ended the first half with the Mustangs leading the Lancers by 26 ponts 46-20.

"We were 4-26 (in shooting) in the first half and that's junior high stuff," Schlimgen said. "I know we didn't get a lot of good shots but we had some shots that were pretty good and we didn't do a good job at the free throw line.

The second half was nearly the same as the first half as the Mustangs increased their advantage to a 30 point lead with a shot by

Mount Marty's Raquel Sutera was influencial in getting some points on the board for the Lancers as she drew two fouls going 3-4 for free throws and had a couple offensive rebounds. Also Mount Marty's Wagner hit two big threes for the Lancers, but the efforts would not be enough as the game closed with Mustangs ahead 79-51.

Next the Lancers will play at Concordia Saturday.

Offense wasn't the issue Wednesday night for the Mount Marty College men's basketball team.

In the first half, at least. Morningside, on the other hand, started strong and never really slowed down in a 102-77 Great Plains Athletic Conference victory over the

The visiting Mustangs shot 77 percent in the first half, helping to overcome a 50-percent effort by the hometown Lancers.

Handed another loss in what has already been a frustrating season, the Lancers (0-9, 0-5) weren't able to take much solace from a strong offensive start.

Not when Morningside (6-4, 3-2) did just about anything it wanted with the ball.

With a previous season high of 77 points, the Lancers appeared ready to threaten that number by halftime.

The only issue was, Morningside was just a step and a half better.

The Mustangs built a double-digit lead within the first seven minutes of the fastpaced first half, but MMC cut the deficit to 32-28 at the 8:57 mark.

Morningside, though, used a 77-percent shooting effort to lead 58-43 by halftime — which could have been a final score a season

AA All-State Team Includes 5 D-I Recruits

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — Of the seven girls chosen for the Class AA all-state volleyball first team, five are going on to play at the Division I level. Of those seven, six are also from Sioux Falls, which sent three teams to the state tournament, including the last two standing for the title.

Each of the four city schools were represented at positions all around the court with Roosevelt's lethal duo of Maggie DeJong and Tagyn Larson highlighting the list selected by the South Dakota Volleyball Coaches Associa-

DeJong, who will move on to Louisville next season, proved the be the most difficult hitter to slow down as she led 'AA' hitters with 528 kills and a .416 hitting percentage. She also had 223 digs and 129 blocks to round out an impressive senior campaign.

Larson, an Iowa basketball recruit, added 315 kills, 193 digs and 62 blocks despite playing the final stretch of the season with a stress fracture in her foot that will sideline her for the beginning of the basketball season.

The tandem caused headaches for opponents both offensively and defensively all season as the Rough Riders cruised past teams not named O'Gorman.

"Tagyn is so athletic. She's able to see the court very well and jumps high," said Roosevelt coach Holly Lynch. 'The same goes for Maggie. She jumps between 10-6 and 10-8 and that's hard to block. They're both so versatile."

While DeJong and Larson were the most dangerous combination in the state, it was the play of O'Gorman outside hitter Taryn Kloth that earned the Knights their first state championship since 2002.

The Creighton recruit stepped on biggest stage with 55 kills over the three-day tournament, guiding O'Gorman to a trio of sweeps while finishing the season with 311 kills and a .360 hitting percentage. The 6-3 junior was also solid defensively, tallying 167 digs and 31 blocks.

"She's just an amazing player," said O'Gorman coach Julie Kolbeck. "With her height and her physical ability, it's amazing some of the tnings sne s abie to do. Then to add the mental aspect and the knowledge that she brings to the game, she really is the complete package."

The only non-hitters on the first team belonged to Washington, which put together a solid season despite graduating its top two hitters from a year ago.

Senior libero Ellie Benson, who will walk on at South Dakota State next fall, paced the Warrior defense with 625 digs, while senior setter Hannah Nieman was an allaround weapon, guiding the offense with 726 assists along with tallying 222 digs, 70 kills and 34 blocks.

'They're certainly the nucleus of our program and have been for three years," said Washington coach LaDan Nesje. "They're incredible athletes. It's unique to have what I think are the best setter and the best libero in the state on one team, so we were very fortunate for the last three years.

Lincoln and Mitchell missed out on the state tournament this season, but their
