week in Seattle. The top three four-level regional," Nebraska seeds remain alive: Texas, Penn State and Washington. No. 4 Missouri and No. 5 Florida were among the

teams knocked out last week. Texas beat Nebraska in a five-set match in Austin in September and has won six of the last eight meetings with the Huskers, including a 2009 regional final in Omaha.
