Creativity Sought For Video Contest

Telling the story of South Dakota's healthcare workforce shortage or cleverly promoting healthcare careers could produce a cash prize for high school students.

The 2014 Healthcare Video Contest is under way. South Dakota students, grades 9-12, are encouraged to create a short video addressing health career shortages or boosting health career awareness.

In the decade leading up to 2020, more than 8,000 new healthcare workers will be needed in South Dakota. There will be a 17 percent decrease in high school graduates between 2002 and 2018. By the year 2025, the number of elderly in South Dakota will double. This creates a challenging situation to meet potential growing demand with a declining supply of workers.

Videos will be judged on four criteria: educational value, entertainment value, originality and content. Videos are to be 5 minutes or less with no more than five participants per team.

Cash prizes will be awarded for the top three teams in each category: first, \$750; second, \$500; and third, \$250. The contest is sponsored by the SD Association of Health Care Organizations, the SD Healthcare Workforce Center and Yankton Rural Area Health Education Center (YRAHEC). Entries will focus on one of two categories: healthcare workforce shortage in South Dakota or the promotion of healthcare careers.

The contest aims to bring a greater awareness to high school students, their peers and others about the demand for healthcare workers in the state.

The Book Shelf

A Tale Of 'Golden' Dreams

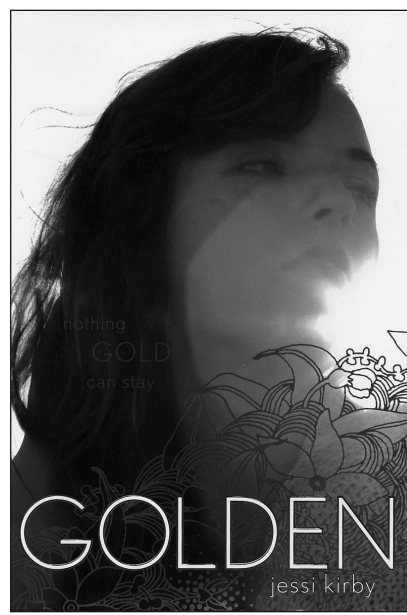
Can your picture yourself 10 years from now? When you're young, you have lots of ideas and dreams about what you'll do with your life. But sometimes people lose sight of those dreams as they get older. What would you tell your future self if you could?

Parker Frost is almost ready to graduate from high school. She's worked hard all her life, taking AP classes, pulling top grades, doing everything right to earn a full-ride scholarship to college. And now she's on the verge of winning that scholarship.

Her friend, Kat, is constantly urging her to do just one unexpected thing in her life — throw caution to the wind and do something crazy. Maybe even with womanizer Trevor Collins, who's been flirting with her for six years.

As part of her scholarship efforts, Parker volunteers as an assistant to her English teacher. Every year he has his students write their dreams and hopes for the future in a notebook. Ten years later he sends the notebooks to the now-28-year-olds. Parker is looking up addresses and sending out notebooks for him when she comes across one written by Julianna Farnetti. She freezes.

Julianna Farnetti and Shane Cruz are almost folklore in town. Julianna and



Shane were high school sweethearts, destined to marry and carry on Shane's family's business. Just days before their graduation, Julianna and Shane got caught in a freak late snowstorm. Their car plunged off the road, down a steep ravine, and into the lake. Their bodies were never found, assumed washed away into the river draining from the lake.

Obviously no one, not even her teacher, remembers that Julianna's notebook is here. Parker knows she should send it to Julianna's family, but

they left town after her death. No one has heard from them or has any idea where they are. Parker is so tempted. What were Julianna's last thoughts and secrets? All Parker knows of her is what she's read in newspaper articles. Who was the real Julianna?

As much as she knows she shouldn't, Parker unseals the envelope and starts reading.

Parker finds herself drawn into Julianna's world, which revolved around Shane. Everything Julianna thought and did was influenced by Shane. She was crazy about him. Then why did she have just a tiny feeling that maybe she wasn't destined to marry Shane and be absorbed by his family and business?

Parker learns that Julianna's life wasn't totally what it seemed to everyone else. And that realization leads Parker to follow Kat's advice and consider doing something totally unexpected. Should she rattle the bones of the dead or let them lie in peace?

This book, for ages 12 and up, is a keeper. The story builds extremely well, drawing the reader into Parker and Julianna's worlds, leading to an unexpected, yet totally logical, end. And it's so refreshing to have pretty much no foul language (2 F-words in the entire book), and no sex just for the sake of being sexy.

Pick up this book about dreams dreamed and dreams lost. It will keep you awake too late reading it.

2014 One Book One Nebraska Announced

"Once Upon a Town" by Bob Greene is Nebraska's reading choice for the 2014 One Book One Nebraska statewide reading program.

In this nonfiction story, bestselling author and award-winning journalist Bob Greene goes out in search of "the best America there ever was," and finds it in a small Nebraska town few people pass through today — a town where Greene discovers the echoes of a love story between a country and its sons. During World War II, American soldiers from every

city and walk of life rolled through North Platte, Neb., on troop trains en route to their ultimate destinations in Europe and the Pacific. This small town, wanting to offer the servicemen warmth and support, transformed its modest railroad depot into the North Platte Canteen. Every day of the year, every day of the war, the Canteen—staffed and funded entirely by local volunteers—was open from five a.m. until the last troop train of the day pulled away after midnight.

Libraries across Nebraska will join other literary and cultural organizations in planning book discussions, activities, and events that will encourage Nebraskans to read and discuss this book. USD Musicians Honored In Contest

VERMILLION — Six student musicians from the University of South Dakota were participants at the South Dakota Music Teachers Association (SDMTA) Conference last month at Brookings.

Jordyn Bangasser, a junior vocal performance major from Sioux Falls, received first place at the Junior/Senior Collegiate Voice Competition. Bangasser is a student of Voice Professor Tracelyn Gesteland, D.M.A. Jared Mogen, a senior music education major from Sioux Falls, was second place in the Junior/Senior Voice Competition while Spencer Smith, a sophomore piano performance major from Hermosa, was honorable mention in the Freshman/Sophomore Collegiate Piano Competition. Mogen studies with Brandon Hendrickson, D.M.A., assistant professor of voice, and Smith is a student of Professor Susan Keith Gray.

Additionally, three USD students will represent USD at the regional competition of the

Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) at Des Moines, Iowa in January. Held in conjunction with SDMTA, the MTNA competition begins at the state level and then advances winners through the regional and national levels. Laura Bertschinger, a USD graduate (M.M. in 2013) in vocal performance from Creighton, Neb., who continues to study under Gesteland, won South Dakota's MTNA Young Artist in Voice Competition. Junior Blake Proehl, a piano performance major from Parkston, won first place in the piano competition. He is a student of Professor Susan Keith Gray while Abigail Sandberg, a junior cello performance major from Hutchinson, Minn., was first place in South Dakota's MTNA Young Artist in Cello Competition. She is a student of Marie-Elaine Gagnon, D.M.A., assistant professor of music.

The SDMTA Conference featured students from USD, South Dakota State University,

Augustana College, Black Hills State University and the University of Sioux Falls. SDMTA was founded in 1955 by a group of educators across the state to improve the standards of teaching music and is an affiliate of Music Teachers Na-

tional Association. Members teach piano, organ, voice, strings, woodwinds, brass and percussion to individuals or to small groups. Any music professional or college music student is invited to join SDMTA.
