The Yankton Gazelles took what looked to be a game headed for a close finish and turned it into a comfortable victory Tuesday night.

In their home opener at the Summit Center this season, the Gazelles increased the pressure of their 2-3 zone defense to smother the Huron Tigers en route to a 59-46 victory.

Yankton improved to 2-0 by making enough shots from the field (17-of-42) while running its offense effective enough to get multiple chances at the free-throw line. And the Gazelles cashed in those tries, making 24-of-31 attempts. Free throws were one of the biggest differ-

ences in this early-season Eastern South Dakota Conference contest. Huron (0-2) shot a similar percentage from the field (16-of-43) but couldn't match the Gazelles at the line, as the Tigers

"A lot of times in games like this, the freethrow line is where games like this are won," Yankton coach Doug Pesicka said. "Not only did we make them — and I'm happy about that but we got there 31 times. That's a good sign for us. To me, when we get to the free-throw line, good things are going to happen."

Good things will happen if the Gazelles can continue to run their 2-3 zone defense like they did in the final quarter. Huron's Jazmin Newton (10 points) hit a 3 to get the Tigers within 43-39 with 7 minutes and 48 seconds to play in the

Huron's next made shot came with 45.7 seconds left. Furthermore, the Tigers scored only four points during that stretch after being within 43-41 with 6:36 to play.

"Our coaches told us to work really hard on defense," Yankton sophomore Becky Frick said. "At the end of the game, we finally got it down and got some steals and some baskets at the other end. We got our rotation down and we pretty much had our defense down."

Yankton's offense came through when it mattered. Up 47-43 with 4:32 to play, the Gazelles scored 10 straight points to take their largest lead of 57-43 on a Frick free throw with 58.2 seconds left.

All of the points scored during that game-deciding spurt came from junior Andi Sprakel (15 points), sophomore Sophie Drotzmann (12 points) and Frick (14 points).

"We know that we can play together and we have a lot of contributors," Frick said. "Sophie and Andi got going and we have a lot of players
