CHICAGO (AP) - Grain futures were higher Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for March delivery rose 2.75 cents to \$6.135 a bushel; March corn was 2.75 cents higher at 4.3325 a bushel; March oats rose 0.50 cent to \$3.4875 a bushel; while March soybeans gained 12 cents to \$13.31 a bushel.

Beef was higher and pork mostly higher on the Chicago Mer-cantile Exchange.

February live cattle rose .93 cent to \$1.3390 a pound; March feeder cattle was .37 cent higher at \$1.6692 a pound; while February lean hogs lost .12 cent to \$.8625 a pound.
