

3. THE OCTOBER STORM

There are storms and there are storms. There are weather events that come and go, and there are events that will leave scars that will be remembered for years.

The massive Autumn Storm in October was one of the latter.

The powerhouse storm — referred to as Winter Storm Atlas — swept across the Upper Plains on Oct. 4-5, dumping more than a foot of snow on western South Dakota and western Nebraska. The energy of the storm was felt to the east, including the Yankton area, which endured thunderstorms and high winds on a Friday night teeming with high school football games. The worst of that was felt in Wayne Neb., where an EF4 tornado, rare for October, skirted the eastern edge of the town, causing millions of dollars in damage.

For South Dakota, the storm had a devastating agricultural impact. It's estimated that tens of thousands of cattle were lost in the freak blizzard, wiping out entire herds and wreaking havoc on the state's farm economy. Since then, numerous benefit events have been held throughout the region, including the Yankton area, to raise money for those producers crippled by the storm.

4. BIRTHDAY BASH BEGINS

More than 400 people turned out to a gala ball in November to start a year-long celebration of South Dakota's sesquicentennial.

The kick-off included local residents taking on the roles of famous figures from the state's past, including President Theodore Roosevelt, Gen. George Custer and Arthur Mellette (last governor of the Dakota Territory and first governor of South Dakota) entertaining guests downtown throughout the afternoon. This was followed by a gala at the Riverfront Event Center that featured Gov. Dennis Daugaard. Many

attendees wore period costumes.

The hope is other towns across the state will begin planning events to celebrate the occasion.

Yankton will again be participating when it will mark the starting point of a planned wagon train to Pierre in September.

5. SHUTTING IT DOWN

Beginning Oct. 1, communities across the nation began to feel the impact of the partial federal government shutdown after Congress failed to appropriate funds for the next fiscal year.

In the Yankton area, the lapse of federal funding partially or completely halted operations for the National Park Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development offices and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

However, many essential services remained operational. These included the delivery of U.S. Postal Service mail, Social Security payments, law enforcement and corrections services, and operations at Gavins Point Dam.

On Oct. 17, regular operations resumed after an interim appropriations bill was signed. The 16-day shutdown was the third-longest in U.S. history.

6. A NEW SUPERINTENDENT

As Yankton students returned for classes this fall semester, they arrived to see a new superintendent at the helm of the school district for the first time in 23 years.

Wayne Kindle officially took over the new role on July 1. The administrator had previously been serving as principal of Yankton High School since 2007.

Kindle replaced Joe Gertsema, who announced his retirement in December 2012 after serving as the district's superintendent since 1990.

Following Gertsema's retirement, the Yankton School Board chose to use a consulting firm to assist with finding a replacement. After conducting a national search and receiving

approximately 40 inquiries for the position, the board selected Kindle.

Kindle has been with YSD since 1991. He began as a sixth grade teacher, moving on to Yankton Middle School in 1994 as the associate principal. He was promoted to YMS principal in 1995, and held that position until accepting the role of YHS principal in 2007.

7. A BOUNTIFUL HARVEST

Following a record drought in 2012, this year saw the benefit of delayed winter weather, a wet spring and timely rains, allowing producers to recover with a strong bumper harvest. Yankton in particular received 29.66 inches of precipitation through November, more than doubling last year's total of 13.39 inches through the same period. The historical average is 23.24 inches.

As producers harvested their crops this fall, space in area grain storage centers became limited by early November, leaving numerous grain elevators with no choice but to store grain on the ground.

The Yankton area's progress fell in line with the majority of the country that also saw a rebound in crop production in 2013. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest corn crop report, the agency estimated the national harvest will achieve a new record of nearly 14 billion bushels of corn. That total is 7 percent larger than the previous record and 30 percent larger than last year's.

8. TIM JOHNSON RETIRES

In a political development that garnered national attention, Sen. Tim Johnson (D-S.D.) announced he would not run for another term in 2014.

The Vermillion native made the announcement at his alma mater, the University of South

Dakota. He told a news conference that he will be 68 years old at the end of his current term and believes it is time to leave office.

In December 2006, Johnson suffered bleeding in the brain known as Arteriovenous Malformation (AVM). He fully resumed his Senate duties but continues to walk with a cane.

Johnson will retire without losing an election. He entered public life as a state legislator in 1979. He won a U.S. House seat in 1986 and served 10 years in that chamber before defeating Republican incumbent Larry Pressler for a U.S. Senate seat in 1996. Johnson won a dramatic 524-vote re-election victory over then-U.S. Rep. John Thune in 2002. Johnson won re-election to his final term in 2008 by defeating Republican Joel Dykstra.

Johnson currently chairs the powerful Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee. He will have served three terms — 18 years — in the Senate. Johnson remains the only Democrat holding a statewide office in South Dakota. His retirement will give South Dakota its first open U.S. Senate seat since 1978.

At the national level, Republicans have targeted Johnson's seat as a key race in winning Senate control.

The open seat has set off a large field of candidates. The slate so far includes Republicans Mike Rounds of Pierre,

Larry Rhoden of Union Center, Dr. Annette Bosworth of Sioux Falls, Stace Nelson of Fulton and Jason Ravensborg of Yankton; Democrat Rick Weiland of Sioux Falls; and a possible independent candidacy from Pressler.

9. HSC DEVELOPMENTS

The historic campus of the South Dakota Human Services Center saw both beginnings and endings in 2013.

Early in the year, the South Dakota Legislature agreed to sell the Mead Building to the Yankton County Historical Society for its appraised value of \$1 should non-profit's renovation efforts succeed.

Throughout the year, work to rehabilitate the 114-year-old building designed by Dr. Leonard Mead continued. Meanwhile, the state also moved forward with a contract to have many of the vacant buildings on the campus demolished.

However, a proposal under consideration from the Foutch Brothers, a development firm, could result in three of the buildings scheduled for destruction to be saved and used as a housing project. The proposal could be the subject of legislation in the upcoming session.

10. WATER WORKINGS

Although Yankton is located along the Missouri River, many challenges still exist to get water into area residents' homes.

With a changing river affecting the future of Yankton's surface water intake and aging treatment infrastructure, the City Commission chose to raise water rates significantly in order to fund more than \$28 million in upgrades during the coming years.

Users were hit with a surcharge ranging from \$15 for those with the smallest meter size to \$1,967 for those with the largest. A surcharge is an amount charged before a customer gets a drop of water.

The commission also decided to charge \$4.93 for every 1,000 gallons of water used — up from the current charge of \$3.52.

Work has already begun to update the 1972 water treatment plant, and a new treatment facility will be built at an undetermined location. Furthermore, a study is being conducted on the possibility of building a collector well at Paddle Wheel Point.

With the improvements, city officials say Yankton will be in a position to meet its projected water demands for decades into the future.
