Yankton County Commission **Gives OK To 211 Service**

The Yankton County Commission agreed Monday to fund a new call service for citizens that will assist in finding community resources.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of implementing the 211 service a couple times during the past year but didn't want to make a final decision until budget numbers for 2013 were finalized. With the county's year-end surplus the largest in memory \$4.7 million — Commissioner Johnson Allen Sinclair admitted the commission couldn't argue that it doesn't have the money for the undertaking. By calling 211, residents will be able to obtain information from the Helpline Center in Sioux Falls on community resources, volunteer services, child care resources, suicide and crisis support, and military and family support. The cost of the service will be 60 cents per person annually, bringing the estimated expense for Yankton County to \$13,462.

Looking back on her first year, she said one of the biggest challenges was educating citizens about water system improvements and convincing them it was worth tens of millions of dollars in expenditures.

SD Woman Moves Wedding To Her Yankton Fiance To SF Hospital For Her Dying Mom

SIOUX FALLS — Rather than fulfill her own dream for a January wedding in Mexico, a South Dakota woman held it at a hospital instead to made her dying mother's wish come true.

Delores Vastenhout, 58, of Leota, Minn., died Friday at Avera McKennan Hospital in Sioux Falls, four days after one of her daughters, Nicole, married her sweetheart, Ken Decker of Yankton. in the hospital's packed chapel. The couple had planned to tie the knot Jan. 11 at a Mexican resort.

"We knew there were two things my

mom really wanted this year," Christy Menning, of Hartford, said Monday. "One was to see my sister get married and the second was to have a family Christmas."

On Christmas Eve, which was the day after the wedding, the family brought all the gifts to Vastenhout's hospital room, decorated it for the holiday and celebrated what would be their last Christmas together.

Menning said her mother, though weak and in a lot of pain, was able to take part.
