# Memoirs' Is Serious Fun

They get to work on time and they do a good job. Sometimes, they might even stay late to finish a project because it's important to be responsible. That's a lesson they've taught you because you take your around-the-house jobs seriously, too.

You always do your chores right because people depend on you. But in the new book "Memoirs of an Elf" by Devin Scillian, illustrated by Tim Bowers, an important job is done correctly because Christmas depends on it! It's Christmas Eve, a quarter to 10, and

Spark Elf is getting antsy. In just two hours, he and his fellow elves Bobbin and Nutshell will help Santa deliver presents. The reindeer are ready, the sleigh is full, and because he feels "so good," Spark snaps an At quarter to eleven, with an hour to go,

it starts to snow and that makes Spark really happy. It would make him even happier if Šanta would hurry up. Santa says Spark worries too much.



And then it's "launch time!" Guam and Fiji are first for gift delivery, followed by New Zealand. Santa starts singing his favorite Christmas carol, and he stops to pet every dog. Santa loves dogs, and they love him, but that takes time and there's none to spare. As Santa plays with a puppy named Tugboat, Spark says it's time to go.

At halfway around the world and with the bag half-empty, the sleigh starts falling behind. Santa needs to step it up, but he's too busy enjoying the cookies that kids have left for him. Santa loves cookies — except ginger snaps. Those are the ones he gives to Spark, Bobbin, and

With nine hours to go, they finish Mexico City. Four hours to go, and they're done with South America so Santa takes a minute

to play with the toys. Spark urges him to hurry. It's almost Christmas morning ... And with a half-hour to go, they finish! But there's something left in Santa's sack. It's something very important that someone will miss very, very much. Can St. Nick save Christmas in the nick of time?

Oh my, but there's all kinds of cute inside "Memoirs of an Elf."

Spark Elf may be my new Christmas hero, in fact, because author Devin Scillian gives him a Type-A personality mixed with just the right kind of holiday sweetness. Spark is businesslike and efficient, yet he still appreciates the tiny things that make the Yule cool, and he's eager to share secrets with kids who are lucky enough to have this book.

But Spark isn't the only irresistible thing here: I was totally charmed by the illustrations from Tim Bowers. They made me want to read this book all over again.

This is not your traditional Christmas story, but reading it surely could become a new tradition for your family. It's meant for kids ages 5-to-10, but "Memoirs of an Elf" is serious fun for anyone.

# **Vespers**

This year's Vespers focuses on the manger, Tice said.

"This year we are celebrating everyone at the manger scene: the shepherds, the kings, the animals, the angels, all who were there those many years ago," he said. "This Vespers performance will also place ourselves at the manger as we sing the carols that help connect us to that time and place, bringing us all to the manger.'

The program emphasizes Jesus as the reason for the season, Tice said. The performance features Mary and Joseph, the angels, kings and shepherds, and the star over Christ's birthplace.

Besides the MMC musicians, Vespers will incorporate an orchestra comprised of professionals, Tice said. The 23-piece orchestra includes strings, winds, horns, percussion and harp. The program also features the reading of Biblical texts and the audience singing of carols.

"There will be a celebration by everyone as we come to the manger," he said. "The message is the same, whether it's 2,000 years ago or tonight.'

Kollasch sees this year's Vespers bringing a special message. "The program this year fo-

cuses on the many aspects of the Nativity that are not always considered," she said. "There are familiar carols as well as some the audience may not have heard before. There is a variety in musical selections that has made it enjoyable to prepare for Vespers. I'm looking forward to performing."

## THE FINAL PRODUCT

The Vespers theme is actually chosen a year in advance, and work begins far before the actual performances, Tice said.

"I pick the music months in advance," he said. "During the summer, I'm solidifying the selections. I look at the size of the choir and the talent that we have. During the fall, I have a contractor who gets the orchestra players. We have the music pulled and ready for them by the end of September or first of October."

The choirs and orchestra have rehearsed on their own, first coming together next Sunday, Tice said. "When the (Benedictine) Sis-

ters finish their Mass on Sunday morning (around 11 a.m.), we move in. We set up for the orchestra, put up risers for the choirs and we lay out the programs," he said. "At 1 p.m., the orchestra ar-

rives and the choir is in place.

The choir and orchestra re-

hearse for the next two hours to get our sea legs, then we have the 4 p.m. performance. The program lasts about an hour, then we have a break before performing at 7 p.m."

Bishop Marty Chapel will carry a special Vespers atmosphere, Tice said.

"James Hovland, our tech director, has worked with the new lighting and the LED lights,' Tice said. "He said it heightens the mood, like when he used green lights for 'Greensleeves.'

MMC uses a Sioux Falls videographer to make the Vespers recording into the final television product, Yager said.

"We have a short window to turn the whole video around, from sound mixing, to editing, to delivery to SDPB for broadcast," he said. "Kenneth and I will travel to Sioux Falls and watch the final cut, make any necessary notes or suggestions, and off it goes. Music does wonders for the soul, and what better way to spread that joy than to use all of the tools that are

available.' The quick turnaround in video production is well worth it, Tice said.

"We are sharing this with a wide audience," he said. "It's a great promotion for the college and its programs. It's worth its weight in gold."

Tice believes the Vespers broadcast and online appearance can become a Christmas tradition. "People can open their gifts, then watch it before they head to Christmas services or the late vigil," he said.

Kollasch looks forward to Sunday's performances as a memorable moment in her MMC experiences. "Vespers is the highlight of

the year in vocal music at Mount Marty College," she said.


