In winning for the fourth straight outing, the Coyotes (6-2) scored at least 80 points for the sixth time in eight games. But the story was that de-

fense The Titans - who had beaten defending Summit League tournament runner-up Denver on the road three days earlier - were 18-of-56 from the field for 32 percent. The Coyotes turned 21 Fullerton turnovers into 22 points.

Was it the best defense by USD this season?

The Doane Tigers scored 49 second-half points and picked up a 79-73 Great Plains Athletic Conference win over the host Mount Marty Lancers Saturday at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena.

The score shows that we defended poorly," MMC head coach Tom Schlimgen said. "When you give up 49 points in a half, you can't be very happy with your performance."

Doane's offensive efficiency, which was fueled by a 62.1 shooting percentage, eight assists and four 3point plays in the half, spoiled a fast start by the Lancers and helped the Tigers overcome 12 first-half turnovers.

The Lancers used three early steals to help build a quick doubledigit lead.

As did the 3-ball.

Raquel Sutera and Alex Kneeland each knocked down triples while Logan Wagner hit her first three shots from downtown as the Lancers held a 19-7 lead just seven minutes into the game.

The Tigers began a series of runs that continually thwarted efforts by the Lancers to ice the game early.

Doane pulled to within 20-18 after treys from Shelbi Bittinger and Brittany White, but the Lancers responded with a timeout and a 3-pointer from Sutera to keep the lead at 23-18.

Heather Broman looked to keep Doane in the hunt with a back-in basket, but a timely trey from Holly Hegge and a 3-point play from Kneeland kept the Lancers ahead by double digits at 40-30 going into the half. The theme continued throughout

the second half; Doane made their runs and the Lancers were able to find a shot to answer.

Doane sliced the Lancer lead to 60-59 on a 3-point play from Hannah Dostal with 9:53 remaining, but Hegge created a 3-point shot for Kneeland by hustling to save a ball from going out of bounds on the Mount Marty possession.

The Tigers finally broke through and gained their first lead at 64-63 on a free throw from Bittinger.

There were no answers from the Lancers until it was too late.

Mount Marty had a chance, trailing 75-73 after a 3-ball from Hegge with 32.5 seconds to play, but free throws from Hanah Barnard and a meaningless breakout basket by the Tigers in the final second sealed the 79-73 Tiger win.

"We just couldn't get stops when we needed them and we didn't make plays when we needed to," Hegge said. "Their offense is pretty good and they're ranked for a reason.'

For the Lancers, three of their four conference losses have come at the Castle.

"It seems like something new comes up in our losses," Schlimgen said. "We're disappointed that we haven't played our best basketball at home.

"Offensively, we played a pretty good game," Schlimgen added. "We were ready to play and we played hard.

The loss also provided a swing in

To start the second half, freshman Jake Anderson netted a three pointer from the corner to cut the Tigers lead down to 40-29.

Mount Marty found positive reinforcements late, as they went on an 8-0 run with nine minutes left. The Lancers trailed 60-45.

We went to more ball screens and penetration," Baker said. "They were packing in on us and it was hard for us to get the ball in the paint. We were able to score off some defensive intensity.'

After being in the double bonus for the last seven minutes of the second half, the Tigers were able to control the Lancers 81-54.

Baker was frustrated with how poorly his team shot. As a team, Mount Marty shot 39 percent from the field and 13 from beyond the arc.

We missed a bunch of shots. I thought we had good looks and we bought it," he said. "On their end, they got open looks and put them in."

"In the second half, they really worked it into the post and found a way."

He was impressed with how focused his team came to play on the defensive side of the ball.

"Our defensive focus and energy was good," Baker said. "We communicated and were much better at focusing in and locked into our assignments. For the most part, it was something we can take from it."
