# **Siblings Patrol The Sidelines For A-H Hoops**

### • t was the night of Tuesday, Jan. 15, 2013.

There was a high school basketball doubleheader between West Sioux, Iowa, and the hometown Alcester-Hudson Cubs. It wasn't a new matchup. The teams had routinely played each other in non-conference action.

If anyone had been paying close attention, though, they would have seen Kevin Kunz — the varsity boys' head coach — step in as a varsity girls' assistant for coach Shannon Hames.

Brother and sister were, for the first time, on the same coaching staff, albeit for only one game.

'It was really nice of him to do that," Hames recalls during an interview at Alcester-Hudson High School, where both teach math and also happen to coach basketball.

"It was fun."

That night, the Cubs handed West Sioux a 58-53 loss, marking the first win for Alcester-Hudson over the lowa school since Hames became the coach five years earlier.

"I don't know if we could do it all the time," Kunz joked. "We'd probably stran-

gle each other." Joking that her brother likes to take credit for that victory, Hames was asked if she'd return the favor someday and sit on the bench as a boys' assistant coach?

Kunz was quick to point out that it almost happened.

"We were close to that a couple years ago, actually," he said. "My head assistant was sick, and her husband (Matt Hames, Kunz's assistant) wasn't sure if he'd be able to make it to the game."

Instead, the Parker natives and Mount Marty College graduates have staked their own coaching claim

while at Alcester-Hudson — Kunz for five years prior at Menno High Šchool.

Kunz, the oldest by two years, began his coaching career as an assistant boys basketball and football coach at Menno, where he later spent four years as the head football coach and two years as head basketball coach. He enters his third season at Alcester-Hudson in 2014-15.

Hames, meanwhile, went right from college into the head girls' coaching position at Alcester-Hudson, and has since won 53 games in six seasons.

It just so happened that her brother was hired as the boys' coach in Alcester, enabling the siblings to fulfill a dream since high school.

'We always talked about that if we could somehow get a job at the same school, we'd have fun," Kunz said. "We both teach math. We can run our own department, I guess you could

'Even when we get away from school, we're still, what, 12 feet away from each other," Kunz said.

Basketball, though, is the passion that binds them.

Coaching girls versus coaching boys presents different challenges, but having a sounding board who also happens to be a sibling allows them to share ideas, they said.

She'll throw an idea at me and I'll think, 'Eh, I don't know,'" Kunz said. "And then you see it at a practice or at a game, and you think, Wow, I was wrong.'

Plus, there's not a fear of a brother or sister sugarcoating their true feelings,

"It's nice to throw those ideas off him, because he'll be honest," she said. "I like that honesty as teachers or coaches. You don't have to worry about over-stepping.
