'We're a really young team, but we have a good group of juniors who have been around for a while, so it's going to be on their shoulders to be leaders," said head coach Ryan Hage, whose team opens its season Saturday at the Watertown Dual

Tournament. The combination of more quadrangulars, triangulars and tournaments, as well as Huber's continued assault on school records, have the Bucks excited for the season,

Of the five wrestlers who qualified for the state tournament last season, Yankton returns three - one to graduation and another who

didn't come out this season. That's a good boost," said Huber, whose career stands at 95-33 entering the season. He'll shortly become the 12th wrestler in YHS history to reach 100 victories.

"And for the guys that didn't get there, they can look up to us and hopefully they can place at state.'

Huber, who set the school single-season wins record as a sophomore, finished sixth at 126 pounds at the state tournament last season. Vornhagen (106) and Abd-Al-Kreem (113) lost their first

two matches in their weight class at state.

"It makes a bunch of us feel better, knowing we have some people who can get to state," Vornhagen said. "We told them how much fun it was, so that makes them want to get there.'

The other juniors for the Bucks include Hiram Alvarez, Jamee Bruegman, Robbie Darcy, Skylar Elle, Javier Flores, Brock Folkers, Zach Hanzlik and Jordan Lucht.

There are also nine sophomores on the roster: Chase Erickson, J.C. Holton, Austin Keller, Victor Lacey, Luke Lammers, Ryan Lucht, Josh Rowell, Kyle Schmidt and Brady Skillingstad.

From there, the roster drops off to three freshmen — Reese Anderson, Cole Diedrichsen and Ray Wermers — who should all make an impact, according to Hage.


But it's up to the three state tournament returners to lead the way.

With us three, I guess we'll be the go-to guys, we're all trying to be good role models," Abd-Al-Kreem said. "And hopefully we can get some new guys to come out.'

In the meantime, the Bucks will have extra matches this season thanks to more tournaments, quadrangulars and triangulars.

Yankton will again compete at the Sanford Pentagon Invitational in Sioux Falls on Jan. 23-24, but a change in that date from last season allowed Yankton to put together its own home invitational — which the Bucks didn't have last sea-

When the Pentagon moved their date up in the calendar, that left a big hole



in February, "Hage sad. "And we jumped on board and let everyone know we would try to host our own invite."

Doing so produced 14-15 teams — from South Dakota, Iowa and Nebraska — that agreed to come to the Yankton Invitational which is set for Feb. 7, Hage said.

For now, it's all about development for the Bucks, Vornhagen said.

"We'll be good pretty soon, we've got a lot of young kids coming up," he said.

Though numbers are down at the varsity level (Hage said the varsity numbers are about 20 shy of what he'd prefer), the middle school numbers are on the rise — 45 in grades 6-8 signed up this year.

What that means for the varsity team is that Yankton won't fill out all 14 weight classes, but that'll only become a factor in duals.

This is a down year for us in numbers, but it goes in cycles," Hage said. "They'll improve, we know that.'

Yankton's Huber Hopes To Add To Record-Setting Season

Spencer Huber has an outside chance to become the all-time winningest wrestler in Yankton High School his-

Just don't expect him to talk much about it.

Huber, a soft-spoken junior, set the program's singleseason wins record (47) last season and will reach 100 career victories early this sea-

With another two seasons like his last, Huber will mount a serious threat at the alltime record of 147 wins (set by Nick Smith in 2004), but Huber would rather let his technique do the talking.

Yeah, he's pretty quiet, but he's a different guy on the mat," said junior teammate Bashir Abd-Al-Kreem.

"He's getting better and better. I go to touch him during our battles and makes his move, and boom I'm down."

Gone is that quiet demeanor and in its place is a record-setting, aggressive 126-pound wrestler who also tied the program record for fastest pin (6 seconds).

"He works his tail off, and the kids know he's the top dog in the room," head coach Ryan Hage said. "He's earned state."

that privilege, and he does a great job during the season, and also during the off-sea-

Sure, there were more matches last season for Huber to set the record, but he was coming off a broken collarbone that cost him most of his freshman season. And he went on to not only qualify for state as a junior, but finished sixth.

"I knew I had an opportunity because of all of our matches," Huber said during a break at a pre-season practice. "And hoping for the same thing again this year, and taking advantage of it."

Huber finished last season with a 47-13 record and now stands at 95-33 for his career - with still full seasons to

"He came on strong last year, no doubt about it," Hage said. "He kept himself in shape, he was in a tough weight class.'

Of all of Huber's teammates, perhaps nobody knows best his style than Cody Vornhagen, now a junior classmate. The two have wrestled together since elementary school.

"And he's gotten a lot better," Vornhagen said. "We worked together in the offseason to get better, and he's working hard to try to win

Any records that come or have come — along the way are only icing on the cake, Huber said.

"It was a really great feeling when I knew I got the record," he said. "And then the fastest pin, that just added to it for me. It really motivated me.

Yankton's first home action of the season is a Dec. 12 quadrangular, but by then the Bucks will have competed at two previous events for Huber to reach the 100-win mark.

"There's probably a good chance he'll do it at home in front of our fans," Hage said. "It'll be something we'll stop wrestling for, and he'll get the recognition he deserves."

Even if such recognition isn't exactly what Huber seeks — despite now being perhaps the most experienced wrestler for the Bucks as a junior.

"He's had a little bit of that (leadership) role for at least a year, and it might not be something he's super comfortable with," Hage said. "But he's a guy that leads

by example, not really by what he says."

gether," McClennen said. This year's team has many strengths according to Mc-Clennen.


'Our defense and goal tending are major strengths this year," he said. "Another thing we have going is our
