Ever since I was given a Heisman Trophy ballot in 2011, the process of voting has worked the same. Assistant sports editor Jeremy Hoeck and I sit down on the Monday after the conference championship games, each with our list of who we thought our top three should be. We then debate it for a few minutes before coming together on a three to put on the ballot. This year, there was no debate whatsoever. Here is how our ballot looked: 1) Marcus Mariotta, QB, Oregon; 2) Melvin Gordon, RB, Wisconsin; 3) Trevone Boykin, QB, TCU. Mariotta was a pretty simple choice for a lot of voters, it seemed. He ranked second all-time in terms of highest voting percentage. He

finished with 788 first-place votes, with the other nine players to receive votes combining for the other 103. (I am not entirely sure what the seven people who didn't have him on their ballot at all were thinking, but that was their concern, not mine.) On the field, Mariotta put up video game-like numbers in an offense that did the same. He finished the season with a Pac-12 record 53 touchdowns (38 passing, 14 rushing, one receiving). He completed 68.3 percent of his passes and threw for 3,783 yards. Of his 372 pass attempts so far this season, only two have ended up in the wrong hands. This year was just Mariotta building on what he'd done in previous seasons. Should the junior decide to head to the NFL after this season, he will finish his career with 101 touchdown passes (pending the Ducks' playoff game(s)) with just 12 interceptions in 1,094

passing attempts. What Mariotta has done on the field pales in comparison to his humble, giving persona off the field. After recent Heisman winners Johnny Manziel and Jameis Winston made more news for negatives on the field, it was refreshing not to have character be a negative for a top candidate. Gordon was also easy to put on the ballot, having rushed for 2,336 yards and 26 touchdowns this season. He held the single-game rushing record for about a week. We went Boykin over Alabama's Amari Cooper, in part because he was a greater factor for his team. Had we had four spots on the ballot, Cooper would have been on there. So, did we get it right? Wrong? myself into?" Rice said. "This is a very good basketball team."

The biggest issue for USD in the first half, though, wasn't so much the size disparity (it actually had a 20-15 rebounding edge), it was turnovers.

Thirteen giveaways by the Coyotes led to 20 points by the Runnin Rebels, who ran their way to a 42-31 lead at halftime. "Mostly it was just our mistakes," Bos said. "For whatever reason, it wasn't like us; wasn't like we usually take care of the ball."

A cold shooting performance to start the second half by the Coyotes certainly didn't help matters, either.

South Dakota made three of their first 12 shots after halftime, and in the mean time, UNLV built a 53-38 lead that closed the 25-9 run.

"In the beginning of the second half, we were triggy happy

with the three," Bos said. "We would've liked to take better shots and get to the rim more."

The Coyotes managed to cut the deficit to eight, 69-61, with 2:02 to play, but a lane violation on USD on an UNLV free throw — the Rebels made the next two — prevented a comeback.

Senior Jelan Kendrick added 13 points for the Runnin' Rebels, while freshman Patrick McCaw had 12 points and sophomore Christian Wood posted 11 points and 10 rebounds.

The common theme? Length and athleticism. "That's the most athletic team we've seen this far, and it's only going to help us for Summit League play," Bos said.

Senior Tyler Larson had 14 points and five rebounds for USD, while junior Eric Robertson had 12 points and nine rebounds off the bench. Junior Casey Kasperbauer added 10 points, and made the team's only two three-pointers.

Losers of three straight, the Coyotes aren't discouraged by their recent performances — particularly in the
