"The Legislature hasn't seen fit to put a special spill fund in," Nadinecek said.

The commission's chairman, Bob McGrath of White, said training money is available but he doesn't know

where equipment money would be found.

McGrath said he doesn't foresee the Legislature imposing fees and won't allow special tax assessments. "I think the legislation approach probably is not going to work," he

said. Nadinecek said state officials should be talking to Congress and federal officials. "So everybody has a level playing field," he said.

There wasn't any call for commission action. DeYoung thanked the commission for listening. McGrath said he wants to keep the issue alive.

the audience to relate Henrickson's character to the homeless.

Two-thousand years ago, shepherds were lowest in society," Conzemius said. "They where thought of as dirty, because they lived outside in the hills with animals. They where unable to even go into the temple because they where considered unclean. The irony is they were preparing sheep to be sacrificed in the temple.

Conzemius said that, despite their low status, they where still some of the first people to hear about Christ's

'This is a guy who lived in a cave," Henrickson said of his character. "He is not really welcomed in society and yet, he was among the first to have this all revealed to him.'

Henrickson said there are a lot of lines of dialogue that resonate with him, but there is one line that especially touches him.

"It was painful to be so close to God's dwelling place, meaning the temple or church, 'and know that I was not invited," Henrickson said.
