Young Named Mid-Major POW

BROOKINGS — SDSU junior Kerri Young (Mitchell) was named the College Sports Madness Summit League Mid-Major Player of the Week Monday after helping the South Dakota State women's basketball team to a 2-1 week at the Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands.

The guard averaged 15 points, 3.6 rebounds and 1.3 assists while shooting 48.3 percent from the field, 57.8 percent from 3-point range and 62.5 percent from the free-throw line. In a 55-54 win over Pittsburgh Nov. 26, Young had a game-high 15 points and 3 assists. Against No. 6 Maryland Nov. 27, she recorded seven points, five rebound and four assists, and a block. In the final game, the Paradise Jam All-Tournament team selection posted career-highs of 24 points and 7 3-pointers.

Young earned her first career Summit League Player of the Week honor Nov. 16.

Lennon Fired At Southern Illinois

CARBONDALE, Ill. — Southern Illinois University Director of Athletics Tommy Bell announced Monday that following a comprehensive review of the football program, head coach Dale Lennon has been dismissed.

Lennon, who took over the program after Jerry Kil left for Northern Illinois following the 2007 season, compiled a 51-42 record in eight seasons at SIU, including a 36-28 mark in Missouri Valley Football Conference games. His first two teams advanced to the playoffs and were 15-1 in league play. During his final six seasons, Southern did not make the playoffs and was 21-27 in MVFC games. In 2015, the Salukis finished 3-8 overall and 2-6 in conference play.

Under the terms of Lennon's contract, which paid him an annual salary of \$220,788, he will receive a \$55,000 buyout. Bell said a search for Lennon's replacement will begin immediately, and he will conduct a press briefing today (Tuesday) at 3 p.m. to discuss the future of the football program.

Sioux Falls Lincoln's Dorman To Receive National Honor

INDIANAPOLIS — Nine individuals who have made outstanding contributions to interscholastic athletics, including Sioux Falls Lincoln's Jim Dorman, have been named recipients of the 2015 Distinguished Service Awards given by the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA).

Dorman began his administrative career in 1997 at Hamlin and spent five years at Madison before heading to Lincoln in 2005. He currently is executive director of the South Dakota High School Coaches Association and represents South Dakota in the National Organization of Coaches Association Directors. In addition, Dorman served a term as president of the South Dakota High School Coaches Association in 2001-02 and the South Dakota Cross Country and Track and Field Coaches Association from 1996 to 1998.

Dorman is very active in the South Dakota Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (SDIAAA), where he has served as executive director since 2000. From 2000 to 2008, he was the SDIAAA newsletter editor and website coordinator. He has also been the SDIAAA's representative to the NIAAA Delegate Assembly 11 times.

Dorman has also served the South Dakota High School Activities Association as a member of the Track and Field and Cross Country Advisory Committee and the Sportsmanship Ad Hoc Committee.

Among his many honors, Dorman was named SDIAAA State Athletic Director of the Year in 2003 and 2012, and earned the NIAAA State Award of Merit in 2002.

These individuals will be honored December 15 in Orlando, Florida, during the banquet at the 46th annual National Athletic Directors Conference conducted jointly by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and the NIAAA.

all-state selection. • Little Wound senior wide receiver Shilo Tallman: The 5-foot-11, 180-pound senior wideout compiled 1,472 all-purpose yards and 18 touchdowns for Little Wound this season.

• Parkston senior defensive tackle Wes Genant: Genant was the complete package for the Parkston Trojans in 2015, clogging up running lanes with his 6-foot-4, 290-pound frame. On defense, Genant racked up 63 tackles, three sacks and seven tackles for a loss. In his high school career, Genant was named a team captain for Parkston, and was a starter on the 2014 state champion Parkston team.

• Tri-Valley senior defensive tackle Brady Johnson: A three-year starter, Johnson played a big role for Tri-Valley on defense this season. He recorded 25 solo tackles and three sacks, and was a two-year starter on defense.

• Aberdeen Roncalli senior linebacker Anthony Andera: Throughout the year, Andera proved to be a versatile defensive option for the Cavaliers. The two-time all-conference selection made 54 tackles, sacked opposing quarterbacks three times, blocked a kick and recorded an interception in 2015. In his career, he recorded eight sacks, 106 tackles and five blocked kicks.

• Groton Area senior linebacker Carter Jondahl: Jondahl was all over the place for Groton Area this season. The 5-foot-10, 200-pound linebacker racked up seven sacks and 102 tackles for the Groton Area defense in 2015. He was a two-year starter at linebacker and recorded 155 tackles and three fumble recoveries in his career.

• McCook Central/Montrose senior linebacker Jerry Kappenman: As an outside linebacker, Kappenman dominated as a run stopper. He racked up 91 tackles (11 for a loss), forced two fumbles and recorded a sack in 2015. Kappenman finished his career with 214 tackles and 22 tackles for a loss.

• Custer senior linebacker Anthony Jones: Jones was a tackling machine for Custer in 2015. The 5-foot-11, 200-pound linebacker had 95 total tackles, three sacks and six tackles for a loss.

• Aberdeen Roncalli senior defensive back Logan Karst: Opposing quarterbacks had trouble throwing in the direction of Karst. The 6-foot, 170-pound defensive back picked off six passes in 2015, and returned three of them for touchdowns. He recovered four fumbles and racked up 41 tackles. He ended his career with 11 interceptions and 65

possibility. "It didn't come as a surprise to us." The contract for the game called for USD to receive \$550,000, and both sides are working out arrangements of a buyout, Herbster said. That now leaves USD to search for another FBS game for the 2016 opener nine months away.

"It comes down to timing," he said. "A month sooner and you've got a large pool of schools to work with, but

now, that pool continues to shrink. We've got leads, we're just trying to follow up with those schools."

Herbster did say that USD has also finalized FBS games in 2017 and 2018, which said the school will be announced at a later date. That only leaves USD a 2019 guarantee game to find for the next couple years. A 2020 date with Iowa State had been previously announced.
