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County Weighs **State Grants**

Meetings Held In Effort To Acquire Funding For Roads And Bridges

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In the midst of a budget crunch on county roadways, Yankton County officials are taking aim at getting another new source of funding introduced with the passage of Senate Bill 1 during the 2015 legislative session.

This week, the Yankton County Commission hosted two special public meetings with members of the county's township boards to discuss the county's five-year road and bridge plan in order to qualify for funds from the state's Bridge Improve-



ment Grant (BIG) grant. Brian McGinnis, Community Development Specialist with Planning District III, was at both meetings, held Tuesday and Thursday of this week. He said legislation has opened up a new channel for funds during Thursday night's meeting.

"With increases in gas taxes and such, there's now money available which is a new fund for counties and townships to secure grants

to improve bridges." McGinnis said. "It's an 80/20

Additionally, eligible counties must also have a wheel tax in place in addition to meeting with townships and having a five-year road plan.

Yankton County Highway Superintendent Brian Gustad said that the funds the county would have access to are limited, however. "We can only access, I believe, \$4 million over

three years," Gustad said. "(The county puts in) 20 percent, or could elect to put in more." Commissioner Donna Freng said there will be

stiff competition for the funds throughout the state. We have to compete with all the other counties in the state," Freng said. "It's not like it's a given that we're going to get this."

McGinnis said that some factors about Yankton County do add to their chances.

"To be eligible for the grant and apply for the grant, you have to have a wheel tax," he said. "Some counties don't have a wheel tax, so in other words, the state says, 'Don't come to us for money if you're not trying to raise your own locally, so you'd better

Lego League Assembles Yankton's Green Thumb

holiday waste.

Yankton's First Lego League (FLL) team, the RTEC-NOIDs directed this year's FLL challenge project towards the holidays - a good idea considering Americans throw away 25 percent more trash during the Thanksgiving to New Year's holiday period than any other time of year, according to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This extra waste amounts to about 1 million tons per week.

"What they are looking for this year is something that focuses on recycling," said the RTEC-NOIDs team advisor Josh Svatos. "FLL follows the mantra of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math). It's another way to make kids think critically."

The U.S. is the top trash producing country in the world, at 1,609 pounds of trash per person per year. About one-third of an average landfill is made up of packaging material.

The bears are currently on display in the store. The event, started by Jolene Williamson, began in 1996 as a "Christmas Dress A Doll" event in which volunteers would dress dolls to be given out. There was also a judging contest to pick the best doll. The dolls were then taken to the Yankton Middle School where the students would gift wrap them for their delivery to the Contact Center.

Eventually, stuffed bears and other plush animals replaced the dolls, allowing both boys and
