## Looking For The Warning Signs

Expert: Healthcare Professionals Can Spot 'Red Flags' Of Human Trafficking

Future nurses who could potentially cross paths with a victim of human trafficking have to know what to do in such a situation.

Deb Fischer-Clemens, senior vice president of Public Policy of the Avera Health System, gave a presentation held Monday evening at Yankton's Avera Professional Pavilion that described human trafficking in South Dakota and how healthcare professionals like doctors and nurses should react if they encounter a human trafficking victim.

Fischer-Clemens said her interest in human trafficking started in the early 2000s when a story broke about a group of captive Filipino women who were forced to do manual labor at a hotel in Chamberlain. Since then, she has kept on eye on the human trafficking issues that have been occurring in the state.

## Revenue Picking Up

Daugaard: Better Revenue Will Allow Larger Proposed Budget

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard said Monday that better-than-expected state revenues will allow him to propose larger budget increases for the 2016 legislative session.

Daugaard is to outline his spending priorities in a Tuesday budget address to lawmakers at the Capitol. Daugaard told The Associated Press that he plans to discuss issues including paying off debt and the work of an education task force

that examined how to raise teacher pay in South Dakota.

But, the governor said he won't outline specific proposals from the task force until his State of the State speech.

Daugaard also said he will discuss the state's work with the federal government on a potential Medicaid expansion, but didn't say whether he would propose an expansion of the program for low-income and disabled people on Tuesday.
