WALL ST. RECAP

A sharp drop in the price of oil on Monday rattled investors and helped push stocks lower across several industries. Investors sold from the start of trading following a decision by OPEC last week not to cut production. Seven of the 10 sectors of the Standard and Poor's 500 index fell, led by energy shares.

Bon Homme Wind Ordinance Begins

TYNDALL — Barring any late action by opponents, the controversial Bon Homme County wind energy ordinance takes effect today (Wednesday).

Tuesday was the deadline for referring the measure, known as Article 17. The ordinance calls for setbacks of 1,000 feet near residences and 550 feet near property lines.

Bon Homme County Auditor Tammy Brunken reported, as of mid-afternoon, her office hadn't received referendum petitions. The ordinance goes into effect immediately unless it is referred to an election or blocked by legal proceed-

Brunken told the *Press* & Dakotan that petitions needed to be turned in to her office by Tuesday. The petitions would have required 194 valid signatures to place the measure on the ballot and block it from going into

Brunken couldn't be reached for a final update

late Tuesday afternoon. She indicated she would consider verifying the petitions today if they were received by the deadline.

The Bon Homme County Commissioners unanimously approved Article 17 last month. The county didn't have statutes regulating wind farms, such as the Beethoven operation near Tripp.

The subject of wind farms has generated heated debate among Bon Homme County residents. The issue arose with the Beethoven construction. The controversy has increased with the proposed Prevailing Winds farm in the same general area.

The recently-constructed Beethoven wind farm lies in Bon Homme, Hutchinson and Charles Mix counties. North-Western Energy recently finalized its purchase of the 80-megawatt Beethoven wind project located near Tripp. NorthWestern purchased the wind farm from BayWa r.e. Wind LLC for \$143 million.

Beethoven would be grandfathered under the
