NOAA Announces ELG Funding Opportunity

The NOAA Office of Education has issued a competitive funding opportunity for education projects designed to strengthen the public's and/or K-12 students' environmental literacy to enable informed decision-making necessary for community resilience to extreme weather events and other environmental hazards.

Successful projects will advance NOAA's mission and build the environmental literacy necessary for community resilience by focusing on geographic awareness and an understanding of Earth systems and the threats and vulnerabilities that are associated with a community's location.

Eligible applicants are limited to institutions of higher education; other nonprofits, including informal education institutions such as museums, zoos and aquariums; K-12 public and independent schools and school systems; and state, local and Indian tribal governments in the United States.

Proposed projects should be between two and five years in duration and have total budget requests of \$250,000 to \$500,000 for all years of the project.

The deadline for applications to this funding opportunity is 11:59:59 p.m. EST on Feb. 8, 2016. Applications must be submitted online via www.grants.gov. It is anticipated that awards under this announcement will be made by Sept. 30, 2016, and that the projects funded under this announcement will have a start date no earlier than Oct. 1, 2016.

Two informational teleconferences with the program officers will occur on Thursday, Dec. 10, from 3-5 p.m. EST and Tuesday, Jan. 5, from 3-5 p.m. Interested applicants may obtain the phone number and related teleconference information by visiting <http://www.oed.noaa.gov/grants/elg.html#page=funding>. WALL ST. RECAP

A sharp drop in the price of oil on Monday rattled investors and helped push stocks lower across several industries. Investors sold from the start of trading following a decision by OPEC last week not to cut production. Seven of the 10 sectors of the Standard and Poor's 500 index fell, led by energy shares.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 14.62 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,077.07.

The Nasdaq composite dropped 40.46 points, or 0.8 percent, to 5,101.81.

The S&P is up 18.17 points, or 0.9 percent.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for March delivery lost 1.25 cents to \$4.8150 a bushel; March corn was up .50 cents to 3.7350 a bushel; March oats rose 6.75 cents to 2.42 a bushel; while January soybeans fell 5.50 cents to \$8.7675 bushel.

Beef lower and pork was higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. February live cattle was off .08 cent to \$1.2707 a pound; January feeder cattle fell 2.60 cents to \$1.5385 a pound; while February lean hogs rose .85 cent to \$5.837 a pound.

Bon Homme Wind Ordinance Begins

late Tuesday afternoon. She indicated she would consider verifying the petitions today if they were received by the deadline.

The Bon Homme County Commissioners unanimously approved Article 17 last month. The county didn't have statutes regulating wind farms, such as the Beethoven operation near Tripp.

The subject of wind farms has generated heated debate among Bon Homme County residents. The issue arose with the Beethoven construction. The controversy has increased with the proposed Prevailing Winds farm in the same general area.

The recently-constructed Beethoven wind farm lies in Bon Homme, Hutchinson and Charles Mix counties. North-Western Energy recently finalized its purchase of the 80-megawatt Beethoven wind project located near Tripp. NorthWestern purchased the wind farm from BayWa r.e. Wind LLC for \$143 million.
