Going Into S.D. Sports Hall SIOUX FALLS (AP) — Former Minnesota Vi-kings linebacker Ben Leber is among 10 people being inducted into the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame next year.

The group will be inducted Saturday, April 9, at the Sioux Falls Convention Center.

Also among the group is Steve Heidenreich, the first South Dakotan to run a 4-minute mile. and Doug Schlepp, who ended his basketball career at the School of Mines as South Dakota's all-time leading collegiate scorer with 2,440 points

Leber actually was chosen for induction in the 2015 class but couldn't attend, so he's being inducted with the 2016 class.

The 1997 Vermillion High School graduate played 10 seasons in the NFL, mostly with the Vikings. He also played for the San Diego Chargers and St. Louis Rams. He retired after the 2011 season.

Also selected for induction in 2016 were Greg Hansen, Doug Schlepp (basketball) and Jim Mitchell (basketball), Patricia Reisdorfer (running) and Joe Trudeau (football). In addition, the class will include Rapid City Stevens wrestling coach Tom Long, Northern State basketball coach/athletic director Bob Olson and referee/ volunteer Rich Hanson.

way you'd want to have it, but that's the way it is," Nagy said. Much like SDSU, North Dakota

State knows full well what it means to come up just short in the conference tournament. The Bison lost to the Jackrabbits in the 2013 Summit League final, and were relegated to the NIT, despite having 23 wins to their credit.

To ensure that doesn't happen,

Summit League teams are especially cognizant of where they - and the conference, overall - sits in the RPI rankings.

In the most recent NCAA.com RPI rankings (updated Tuesday), the Summit League had four teams in the top-100 and another just outside the top-100. Leading the way was Oral Roberts at No. 39, followed bv South Dakota (87), Fort Wayne (93), Western Illinois (95) and South Dakota State (105).

The non-conference portion of the schedule is a situation where league teams find themselves cheering for everyone else, Nagy said. We all compete, and we all want to beat each other," he said.

On the other hand, he said, "We can also lift each other up. Wins like these help all of us, there's no question about that.'

If the Summit League maintains its No. 10 or 11 standing among D-I conferences, and its league teams remain high in the rankings, conference games shouldn't punish those teams, Nagy said. In other words, as long as you stay high, you're not likely to drop much.

And wins over the likes of TCU

and Minnesota are sure to keep Summit League teams right where they want to be.

The conference had two games Wednesday night against high-major leagues: Fort Wayne at Indiana and Omaha at Missouri. And then down the line, Oral Roberts plays Oklahoma, SDSU plays Texas Tech, Oral Roberts faces LSU and USD plays Illinois.

Nagy is familiar with what it takes to win those kinds of matchups

His Jackrabbit program has in recent memory scored wins over

Iowa, Washington and New Mexico.

"We're to the point where we've won several games like that, and I think our players expect it," Nagy said.

Winning on the road at Colorado State in the NIT last season may have sparked the confidence that the Jacks could beat anybody, the coach added.

"That gave them the feeling that they could play with anybody, Nagy said. "Now, it's not like, 'Oh, I hope we can beat these guys.'
