Crowded Heisman Field For 2016 Starts With Watson, McCaffrey

NEW YORK (AP) — Even before the Heisman Trophy is handed out Saturday night, it is tempting to look ahead to 2016 and what could be a doozy of a race for college football's most famous bronze statue.

While Alabama's Derrick Henry is likely to both win the Heisman and head to the NFL after the Crimson Tide's playoff run, the other two finalists, Clemson quarterback Deshaun Watson and Stanford scat back Christian McCaffrey, are sophomores who will return.

Add Oklahoma's Baker Mayfield, Florida State's Dalvin Cook and LSU's Leonard Fournette and there is a strong chance five of the top eight Heisman vote-getters from this year will be back in 2016.

"It's a monster class," said Chris Huston, a Heisman historian and editorin-chief of Heisman.com.

Henry, Watson and McCaffrey arrived Friday in New York from Atlanta, where

2015 Award To Be Presented Today they attended the ESPN awards show at the College Football Hall of Fame.

They were greeted in the Big Apple by a traffic jam that turned a 7-mile trip from LaGuardia Airport to the Times Square into a 2-hour journey. The delay cost them lunch at an Italian restaurant, but otherwise all was well.

"I'm just enjoying the moment and happy to be here," Henry said. Being a finalist is a once-in-lifetime

event for most players, often the culmination of a great career. For Watson and McCaffrey, maybe this is just a test run.

Of course, next year I want to be back. And if I happen to stay my senior year I want to be back then," Watson said.

Only twice (2008 and '10) in the previous 10 seasons have at least two of the top three finishers in the Heisman voting returned to school the next year. Only twice in the last 10 seasons (2012 and '06) have five of the top eight returned the next season. The contenders in 2016 aren't con-

fined to just those players whose names

will show up in the final voting Saturday night.

Georgia's Nick Chubb, one of the preseason favorites this year, will return from an injury, as well as Washington State's Luke Falk and Baylor's Seth Russell. Though maybe Jarrett Stidham will be the Baylor quarterback with the Heisman hype? Ohio State's J.T. Barrett should be

the Buckeyes starting quarterback from Day 1 and there is a good chance people will start noticing that Oregon's Royce Freeman is as good as all those stud running backs down South.


Notre Dame's DeShone Kizer and Houston's Greg Ward Jr. will be trying to build upon breakout seasons.

Big 12 Won't Punish Iowa State For Students Rushing Court

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) -Seven months after toughening penalties for schools whose fans rush onto the field of play, the Big 12 Conference said Friday it will not discipline Iowa State after students stormed the court following a basketball game in a scene that left a newspaper columnist with a broken leg.

The league said Iowa State handled the postgame celebration consistent with Big 12 guidelines for sportsmanship and ethical conduct, adding that it considers the matter resolved.

Randy Peterson of the Des Moines Řegister was knocked over while walking from press row to a postgame news conference Thursday after fans rushed the court in nearby Ames following Iowa State's 83-82 home win over rival Iowa. Peterson broke the tibia and fibia in his left leg, but said Friday he has no problem with what happened.

"If fans want to storm the court, they're going to do it," Peterson told The Associated Press in his room at a Des Moines-area hospital. "It happens everywhere. I mean, this is just this year's incident ... it just so happens that it happened to me. I think the Big 12 will look at it not just because of this. I think they've probably been

Johnson Leads Iowa State Women Past

No. 23 Iowa AMES, Iowa (AP) — Seanna Johnson scored 22 points, including two free throws with 5.4 seconds left, and Iowa State rallied to defeat No. 23 Iowa 69-66 on Friday night.

Ally Disterhoft, who led the Hawkeyes with 26 points, missed a contested 3-pointer over Bridget Carleton at the buzzer.

Iowa (8-2), which lost its 10th straight at Ames, led 33-28 at the half and 54-46 entering the fourth quarter before the Cyclones (5-3) rallied.

It became a duel between Disterhoft, who had nine points in the fourth quarter, and Johnson, who had 11. The duo combined to score the last 12 of the game in the final two minutes but Disterhoft missed a free throw with seven seconds left.

The Hawkeyes made 4 of 15 shots in the fourth quarter, Iowa State 8 of 15.

Johnson also had 10 rebounds and five assists. Disterhoft had eight rebounds and three assists.

looking at it for a while.

The incident with Peterson was indeed the first major test of the Big 12's stricter guidelines. The league passed a measure in May allowing it to fine member schools — even taking away a future home game if necessary — for failing to keep fans from storming courts or rushing fields after games.

The measure came on the heels of an ugly incident in February at Kansas State, where Kansas coach Bill Self was pushed up against a press table after the Wildcats beat the Jayhawks. Kansas State officials apologized and said its security staff had failed to get into position in time.

Lou Marciani, the director of the National Center for Specta-

tor Sports Safety and Security at Southern Mississippi, said the first priority for a university in such incidents is to ensure that the players, coaches and officials are immediately protected by getting them to their locker rooms safely.

But there is little that can be done to stop determined fans from swarming a field or court after a big game.
