Jack was born to Loyal and Martha

Gunderson on the family farm near Meckling on Aug. 18, 1930. When he was 10 years old, his family moved to a farm in the Mission Hill area. He joined the Air Force in September of 1950.

Jack married Diane Bruget on May 27, 1951 in Volin. While he was in the Air Force, Jack and Diane spent two years in Anchorage, AK, later rotating to Spokane, WA, before coming home to South Dakota in October of 1953.

Jack farmed in the Mission Hill area and was active in community service, which included serving on the board of the Mission Hill Farmers Elevator, and as president of the Mission Hill School Board. He was a member of Vangen Lutheran Church, Mission Hill, and the American Legion. He was also a Civil Air Patrol commander and a 62-year member of the Elks.

One of Jack's greatest passions was flying and he earned his private pilot's license in 1954. He continued flying for many years.

When he became unable to farm due to health reasons, Jack and Diane decided to become vagabonds, selling Black Hills Gold jewelry at fairs, festivals and open air markets all over the country. Finding a good market in Yuma, AZ, they spent six

months of the year there selling to winter visitors. They then would travel to northern California where they worked for four weekends before coming home by Memorial Day. In July they would work in Minnesota, followed by August in Nebraska, ending their seasons for many years in Lincoln at the Nebraska State Fair.

Having been an over-the-road truck driver for a few years before selling Black Hills Gold, Jack really enjoyed traveling, which carried on after he and Diane hit the road in their motor home, with Diane as his faithful navigator and co-pilot.

In 2002, Jack and Diane started spending their summers in Yankton, and in 2011 they moved there permanently.

Jack was diagnosed with

esophageal cancer in 2009 and fought it until God was ready for him to come home.

Jack was a loving, gentle man, and although flying was one of his greatest loves, his family was first and foremost in his heart.

He is survived by Diane, his wife of 64-1/2 years; son, Chris and special friend, Susan Stahlecker, daughters, Lynn (Tom) Balfany and Beth (John) Hoebelheinrich, all of Yankton; grandchildren: Brandy (Brian) Salts of Yankton, SD, Corey Gunderson and special friend, Jen Gratzfeld of Sioux Falls, SD, Brooke (Michael) Brown of St. Paul, MN, Maggie (Rob) Fogle of Sioux Falls, SD and Tait Balfany and Megan Balfany, both of Yankton; great-grandchildren: Alexandra, Oliver, Davian, Tori, Morgan, Avery and Pria; his sister, Phyllis Karolevitz

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Robert 'Gene' Bunnell

Gene Bunnell was born on December 14, 1937 at Sacred Heart Hospital in Yankton, the second child of Hubert Charles and Blanche (Pierce) Bunnell. Eventually, the little family home on Picotte Street was home to four Bunnell children – Donald Gary, Barbara Joyce, Robert Gene and Betty Joan.

The family located to a larger home and, always full of energy, Gene enjoyed the wide open spaces which surrounded that home, just two blocks north of Crane-Youngworth Field (at that time, the end of the settled Yankton community). There were successions of dogs that entered and left the family; there was a pen which housed hens for laying, there were wheeled vehicles that came and went but there was no horse. Alas, Gene always

wanted a horse!

After completing his elementary years at Beadle School, Garfield School and Central School, Gene went to Washington State to live with his father, completing his high school years but coming home during the summers to work and be a part of the local family. During that time in Washington, he met Marianne Blewett, forming a loving relationship that lasted until they were separated by his death. Marianne and Gene celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary on November 8, 2015.

The Bunnell family left Yankton in the late 1950's, moving to Montana for one year and then to southern California. Gene retained his fascination with cars and other things with wheels and became interested in working with young people in a school setting. Both he and Marianne attained advanced degrees and entered the teaching field where they found satisfaction and success. They took their young family, Bob and Kathie, to the state of Oregon where once again they found open spaces large enough to field a horse! As a matter of fact, there was space enough for many horses so in addition to teaching, Gene became a breeder of horses and developed a strain of cutting horses which eventually produced a World Champion. That horse, named Doc Bunnell, led Gene and his family on many adventures over many miles all through the United States. It was not unusual for their huge motor home to pull up to a family member's front door unexpectedly while en route to a horse show and surprise everyone with an impromptu reunion. Yes, Gene finally did get his horse!

Gene was a true entrepreneur. He could see possibilities and potential successes in situations where others could not. Among his many enterprises (including teaching) were dealing in antiques, owning and operating a tractor store, collecting and refurbishing period radios and during his "leisure" he enjoyed playing basketball and being with his son, Bob, and daughter, Kathie and (eventually) their children. The "men of the fam-

ily" shared an excitement with speed and often three generations of Bunnell men would head to the speedways and enjoy a weekend of racing. Sadly, Gene and Marianne's youngest grandson, Dylan, lost his life in a motocross accident in 2015 during one of those weekends.

There were often crowds of people in the house or on the grounds of the Bunnell home, but Gene also enjoyed his solitude; he would often pull himself away from a noisy gathering and find a quiet spot for contemplation, planning and dreaming. Very often the result of one of those "think times" would be another new venture.

Two years ago, on his 76th birthday, Gene suffered a stroke which required a great deal of therapy and hard work on his part augmented by encouragement and wonderful care from Marianne. He improved daily and suffered very little observable long-term damage. However, within this last month it became apparent that other conditions were threatening his life; when hospital care was no longer seen as the answer to his more and more debilitating condition, he was placed in hospice care at the family home in Oregon City, Oregon. Soon family members began to gather and on Tuesday, December 8, 2015, Gene passed away in the home which he shared with Marianne. He was surrounded by Marianne and her siblings, his own siblings (Joan Bunnell Neubauer, Barbara Bunnell Haney, Gary and his wife, Marie Bunnell) as well as his children and grandchildren, one great-grandchild and more than a dozen close family friends. It was a peaceful passing as all present raised his soul to Heaven with prayer and wished him eternal rest.
