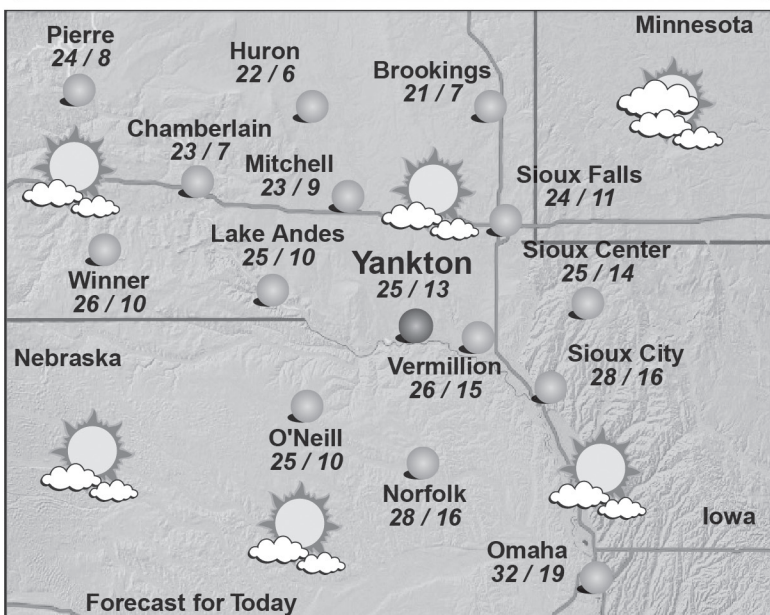

USD Law Professor Publishes Book On Experiences As Tribal Appellate Justice

VERMILLION — University of South Dakota School of Law professor Frank Pommersheim has published a new book entitled "Tribal Justice: 25 Years as a Tribal Appellate Justice." The work provides an in-depth review and survey of tribal appellate court jurisprudence, including enrollment and disenrollment, civil rights, elections and political participation, criminal law and procedure, rights of juveniles, tribal constitutions and tradition and custom.

The book focuses on the procedure and substance of tribal court appellate decision making as revealed in the text of actual court opinions.

"Frank Pommersheim is the modern apotheosis of Ksa, Nanaboozhoo, Quetzalcoatl, Athena, John Marshall and the Buddha — all legends of judicial wisdom. Tribal Justice is a powerful culmination of his career work so far and gives us

all hope for another quarter century of his judgment, experience, and calm thoughtfulness," said Matthew Fletcher, professor of law at Michigan State University College of Law in his review of the book.

Pommersheim was born in New York City but has lived in South Dakota for more than 35 years. Prior to joining the USD faculty in 1984, he lived and worked on the Rosebud Sioux Indian Reservation for 10 years. He currently serves on a number of tribal appellate courts throughout Indian country, including chief justice for the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribal Court of Appeals and the Rosebud Sioux Supreme Court. Pommersheim writes extensively in the field of American Indian law. He is the author of "Braid of Feathers (American Indian Law and Contemporary Tribal Life)" and numerous scholarly articles.

Pommersheim is a contributor to the 2005 edition of Felix Cohen's "Handbook of Federal Indian Law." Pommersheim's "Broken Landscape: Indians, Indian Tribes and the Constitution" was published in 2009 by Oxford University Press and has recently been released in paperback.

He also has received the University of South Dakota Belbas-Larson Award for Excellence in Teaching, the South Dakota Peace and Justice Center Reconciliation Award, and the John Wesley Jackson Award as an Outstanding Professor of Law. Pommersheim is also a poet. His book prior to this most recent selection was east of the River: "Poems Ancient and New." A chapbook entitled "Small is Beautiful: The Buddha Correspondence" was published last spring.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks climbed Wednesday after the Federal Reserve raised interest rates, a long-expected vote of confidence in the health of the U.S. economy. The Fed emphasized that further increases will be gradual.

SIoux FALLS — AAA is urging holiday partiers to call the auto club if they have had too much to drink and feel unsafe behind the wheel. "Topsy Tow," AAA South Dakota's community service program, will give up to two people and their vehicle a ride home at no charge, no questions asked.

Topsy Tow is open to everyone, AAA members and non-members alike, in Sioux Falls, Rapid City, Mitchell and Yankton from 6 p.m. Friday, Dec. 18, to 4 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 2.

"We're aware that over holidays, people tend to drink more alcohol than at other times," said Marilyn Buskohl, spokeswoman for AAA South

Dakota. "AAA wants South Dakotans to know there's an alternative to climbing behind the wheel and perhaps getting into a crash. We're geared up for a busy 14 days of providing Topsy Tows over Christmas and New Year's; we hope we get lots of calls."

The auto club says over the holidays, up to 40 percent of all traffic crashes in South Dakota involve alcohol.

To access the service, call 800-222-4357 (AAA-HELP) and request a Topsy Tow. AAA will come get you and your vehicle and give you a free tow within a 15-mile radius of point of pickup. However, there's only one place AAA will take you, and that's home.
