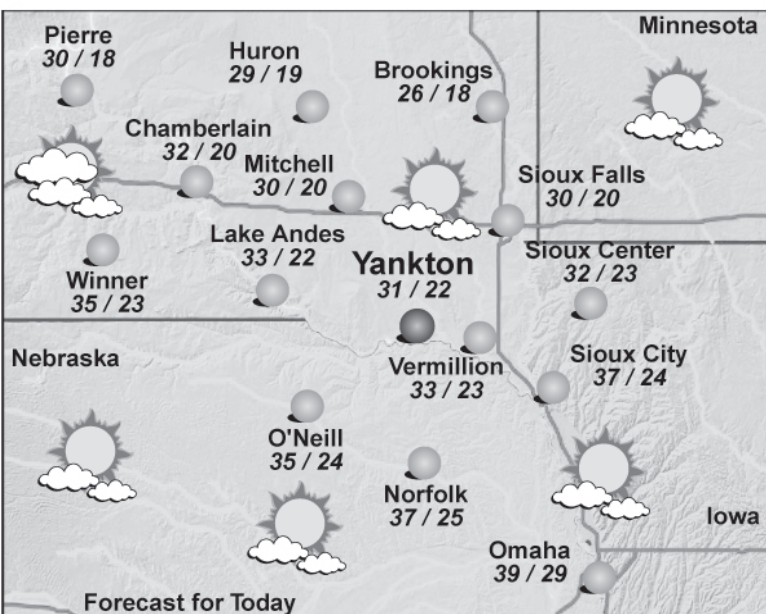

Residents Lose Power Sat. Morning

Parts of Yankton experienced a power outage Saturday morning. According to Brad Wendande, local operations manager for NorthWestern Energy, approximately 2,700 customers in the east and south-central parts of Yankton were without power for up to 50 minutes until power was restored. Wendande said there was a problem with a high-voltage line to the new substation east of town, and this impacted three other substations. The first substation was brought online in about 35 minutes, a second came back in about 45 minutes and the third was restored in about 50 minutes.

Free Clinic Set For Today In Yankton

Servant Hearts Clinic a free, Christ-centered medical clinic, will be open today (Monday) from 5:30-8 p.m. at its new location, 232 Capital Street, Yankton. This is a completely free medical clinic for urgent care conditions. Servant Hearts Clinic provides care for physical, mental health, emotional and spiritual issues. The clinic may serve as an entry point to other services within the community. It is asked that patients not enter the building until 5:15 p.m. to allow staff time to completely set up and prepare for clinic. If you are planning on being seen at the clinic, be there by 7 p.m. to allow adequate time to be seen by providers. Services NOT provided by SHC at this time include dental, diagnosis or treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, HIV testing, prenatal care, treatment for Emergency Medical Conditions, radiology, immunizations and chiropractic care. The staff does not prescribe any narcotics. Future clinics are planned for the first and third Monday of each month. The date of the next clinic is Jan. 4, 2016. "Results from the survey will help us identify what steps need to be taken first for the creative downtown district," says sub-committee member Kristen Hicks. In addition, there will be a Christmas tree drop-off point for Yankton residents at the parking lot west of the Riverside Park baseball stadium. Christmas trees can also be taken to the Yankton Transfer Station during regular business hours of Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m.-3:45 p.m. The Christmas tree drop-off point and the Transfer Station will start accepting trees beginning after Dec. 26 through and including, Friday, Jan. 8.

of God, community, hospitality and lifelong learning. "In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says, 'The gift you have received, give as a gift,'" Koleccka said. "You, in turn, can give to others the gifts of these core values." Koleccka asked pointed questions on how the graduates will accomplish this, and then used an example from her life. "I remember trimming the long, thick, curled toenails of a patient in a clinic," she recalled. "It was one of those times I could truly see the beginning, before and after of what I've done. I had a new awareness of God in that foot washing and toenail trimming." She advised graduates to look to share moments of hospitality in unlikely places, from waiting in a store check-out line to avoiding road rage after being cut off while driving. She also emphasized the importance

of being hospitable towards oneself.

"I don't mean being selfish," she clarified. "For self-care, we need to nurture our body, mind and spirit."

She recalled a fire at the monastery in 1997, after which members of MMC and Avera Sacred Heart Hospital brought supplies to the Sisters during their time of need.

"The people of our two closest sponsors were now ministering to us and extending their hospitality," she said.

She added that graduates should continue their education if they feel inclined to do so, and respond generously should they be asked to step up to a new position of responsibility.

"Part of lifelong learning is openness to God's plan for us," she said. "I encourage you to write your own mission statement and consider including a willingness of God, community, hospitality and lifelong learning."

Saturday's graduates ranged from Kevin Thomas earning a Master of Science Nurse Anesthesia degree to

Lauren Jansen with a degree in English and History. Both agreed that MMC played a crucial role in helping them develop professionally in their individual crafts.

Jansen, who is interested in employment in the publishing field, learned about how to handle writing rejections and about the publication process by helping develop the "Paddlefish" and "4 P.M. Count" journals. One of her writing works was published in this year's "Paddlefish," for which she won first place in the fiction category.

"It gave me a feel of the copy-editing process that

goes into making a book a tangible thing," she said.

As for Thomas, he learned the importance of learning to work with colleagues and patients.

"Our whole job is about working with people in the community, so we have to be open with them and make them feel welcome and comfortable under our care," he said. "That's something the college really focuses on and helps us to be confident when we're in the field. It's part of who we are and what we do."

ple in need," said Cantrell. "I had extra stuff, Bobbie (who works at No Place) had extra stuff, so Bobbie and I decided 'let's put it up out front and see what happens.'" Bobbie's son, Lance Sweet, Jr., 7, has been an enthusiastic helper throughout the project.

The Warming Pole was put up late Nov. 28, with a variety of winter items, including infant mittens, toddler bibs, and "things are just flying off the pole," Cantrell said. Perhaps 20 items started it out, and it has been a fairly constant trade-off since.

It has been refilled several times, either from people from the community, or Cantrell herself buying some items to fill empty spots. "Anybody can put any-

thing on there if they have any extras," she said. "It's open to the public for them to take or give — we are not picky."

There are people in need in the community, she agreed, or "maybe they just forgot their gloves — I've done that on many occasions." Then, if not needed, they are put back on the pole.

The first couple of days were really slow, she said, but then it caught on with the kids: "it is more the kids taking it than the adults, it looks like."

Cantrell said she plans to leave it up until it has served its purpose and things are no longer moving off of it. Then what is left, she said, will be given to one of the local area charities.

"It is all about giving," said Cantrell, adding, "It's a little pole in a little town with a big heart."
