North Dakota's Mia Loyd, the Big Sky Pre-Season Player of the Year, put up a game-high 22 points and grabbed seven

boards. Teammate Leah Szabla scored a career-high 21 points. Makailah Dyer added 16 for the Fighting Hawks. South Dakota held the lead

for nearly 38 minutes of the contest. The Coyotes' reached their largest lead of 13 at the end of the first. With both teams scoring 12 points in the second quarter, the Coyotes took a 35-24 lead into the half.

North Dakota went on a 15-8 run in the final six minutes of the third quarter with eight points from Loyd to make it a one-basket game. A layup by Dyer with 7:55 remaining in the fourth put the Fighting Hawks up 50-49.

The Fighting Hawks gained momentum as the lead changed four times in the beginning of the fourth. Seekamp hit a 15-foot jumper with 7:27 to go to quiet the crowd inside The Betty. Hemiller had a steal two minutes later that she ran down court for an easy layup and extend the Coyotes' lead

North Dakota would foul six times in the final 1:17 to

send the Coyotes to the line. South Dakota sank 6-of-9 from the charity stripe to hold onto

Overall, South Dakota was 27-of-57 (47.4 percent) from the field, forced 23 Fighting Hawk turnovers, and held a 19-11 advantage in bench points. North Dakota also shot 47 percent (25-of-53) from the field.

The Fighting Hawks won the rebounding battle 34-28 which resulted in 20 secondchance points to South Dakota's eight. Liveringhouse and McCloud both had a team-high five boards.

trailed in a 91-79 victory over South Dakota on Saturday. Hill was 10 of 16 from the floor with four 3-pointers and had five assists. Jalen Coleman-Lands added 17 points with four 3s for Illinois (7-5), which has won four

"Our offense was about as good as it's been all year," Illinois coach John Groce said. 'We were really hitting on all cylinders.

The Illini opened on a 14-0 run behind eight-straight defensive stops, and led 55-36 at the break.

"Illinois really came out of the gates hot," South Dakota coach Craig Smith said. "We just dug too big of a hole in the first half."

Tre Burnette had a career-best 27 points on 10of-17 shooting to lead South Dakota (7-5).

Burnetté made three 3-pointers and Trey Norris made a jumper during an 11-4 spurt to pull the Coyotes to 84-78 with two minutes left. Michael Finke answered with a 3-pointer, and Hill and Coleman-Lands each made a pair of free throws to seal it.

Illinois shot 47 percent on 14-of-30 shooting from beyond the arc.

These points don't really mean anything to me," Hill said. "I was actually pretty upset at the end of the game just because we made it a closer game than it needed to be.

Illinois: Malcolm Hill was 10 of 11 from the line and has scored in double figures in each game this season. His career-high against South Dakota surpasses his previous career-best 28 points he scored against Maryland in Jan. 2015. ... Michael Finke finished with 13 points and Kendrick Nunn added 10 points as the Illini had four players in double figures. ... The Illini beat South Dakota in their previous meeting, 96-

56 during the 1971-72 season. South Dakota: Guard Tre Burnette was 5-for-9 from beyond the arc, also a careerbest. ... The Coyotes have lost two of their last three games since snapping a fivegame winning streak.

Illinois forward Michael Finke hit a game-sealing 3-pointer with a minute to go, finally putting the game out of reach at 87-78. A minute prior, Coyote guard Tre Burnette made it an 84-78 game with a 3-pointer, but missed one on the next possession that would have made it a

Illinois started on a 14-0 run, and shot 60 percent from 3-point range, taking a 55-36 lead into the half. "When you allow a team to shoot 60percent in a half, you're not going to win many games," South Dakota coach Craig Smith said. Illinois shot 59.4 percent from the field in the first half, and never trailed.

STAR POWER Malcolm Hill has led Illinois through a difficult nonconference run, putting up double digits in all 12 games this season. The Illini have been without starters Tracy Abrams, Mike Thorne Jr. and Leron Black due to injuries. Starting guard Kendrick Nunn also missed the first two weeks of the season with a

# **Hastings Men Hold Off Mount Marty**

The Mount Marty College men's basketball team lost to Hastings 71-61, after a close first half in Great Plains Athletic Conference basketball action on Saturday at Cimpl Arena in Yankton.

"It was one of those games, whoever made a couple tough shots was going to get it," MMC coach Andrew Baker said. "It was a knockem, drag-em out game tonight and we just fell short.'

The Lancers led for most of the first half until Hastings' Connor Musiel went on a small tear to give the Broncos a 28-26 lead going into halftime. Mount Marty was led in the first half by Anthony Stransky's two three-pointers and Alex Irvine's five points.

"Mount Marty really got on us early, our defense held on, but our offense needed to be a little bit better," Hastings coach Bill Gavers said. "We staved on course and didn't get panicked when we got behind early.

Musiel started the second half right where he left off in the first scoring from three and then adding two more buckets at the rim as Hastings would rattle off an 16-2 run to build a 16-point lead with 14:36 remaining which never faltered. Jake Hansen hit two threes down the stretch, while Carson Blum led the Broncos in the second half with nine of his 11 points.

"Musiel came out had six or seven points in a row, our defensive intensity staved the course, and that's what gave us a little bit of separation,' Gavers said. "At the end of

the game when Carson Blum attacked the rim instead of shooting a three and when Rich Williams attacked the rim, those are plays that make a difference.'

The Lancers in the second half were paced by Irvine who scored 14 points on 4-of-5 shooting and 6-of-7 from the free throw line to finish the game with 19 points along with nine rebounds. Stransky hit another pair of threes for Mount Marty, but it wouldn't be enough in the loss.

"I think we missed some shots, we got to the free throw line and missed some, we missed a few in a row and tend to tense up a bit or take a quick one to try and catch back up," Baker said. "We did some things well in our offense and then they kind of picked up and took a couple of those options away.

According to Gavers, it came down to shutting down MMC guard KJ DeCristino.

'I give Mount Marty a lot of credit, last time out against Concordia, coach Baker did some nice things with his team," Gavers said. "DeCristino started playing the point, and DeChristino can play, he handles the ball well, he can

"I think our two guys defensively I think did a good job at pressuring him, maybe wearing him out a little bit, and giving him harder looks

the team, it means a lot to win this game.'

Winckler started the game, but then fell into foul trouble and left the game with a cut on her elbow before returning in the game's final moments. "Gutty kid, she is a good

Those preparations allowed the Lancers to take a 45-41 lead into the locker room at the half led by Alex Kneeland, who had 11 of 15 in the first half, including 6-for-6 from the free throw line, and Logan Wagner's three triples for nine points in the half. Mount Marty shot seven more free throws then Hastings while finishing a perfect 12-for-12 at the line.

We prepared hard, and I'm sure they prepared hard for us," Schlimgen said. "We knew they were a really good defensive team and we really had to execute in our halfcourt offence and try to be really solid on the defensive

The gameplan worked out for the Lancers in the first half, but to start out the second half, Hastings rolled off on a 16-0 run to go up 57-45 before Brittni Bormann ended the run by nailing two free throws. Schlimgen called three timeouts during the run and had one clear message during each timeout.

Our kids came out and tried to do too much individually, we had a lot of shots off the dribble and early," Schlimgen said. "Every timeout we said we have got to get in our spacing, we have got to play our game instead of taking early shots or trying to do it yourself, we need to do it as a team.'

Ten points was the biggest deficit Mount Marty saw for the rest of the game as it battled back to trail 60-56 at the end of the third quarter.

In the final quarter, Mount Marty battled back and tied the game at 71 on back-toback layups by Gebhart with one minute remaining. Hastings' Chelsey Morten gave the Broncos the lead back on a two-point jumper, before Winckler would tie it again

at 73.

The Broncos called timeout and had 16.7 seconds to run one play and try to win. Hastings' point guard Abby Jackson's pass was stolen by Raquel Sutera, who then passed the ball to Gebhart, who would assist Winckler on

the winning bucket. The win puts the Lancers at 8-5 (3-4 GPAC) on the season and gives Hastings, 11-2 (5-2 GPAC) just its second
