U.S. House candidate Paula Hawks told The Associated Press on Monday that she anticipates putting all of her atten-

tion back into campaigning in January. Hawks says her 15-year-old daughter found a lump in her neck in early November. She's undergoing surgery to remove the mass, which doctors believe is benign.

A conservative blog has commented on the lack of activity from Hawks' campaign. Hawks says she intends to "do what it takes to be a competitive candidate in this race.'

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — A man accused of shooting at an occupied car several times in Sioux Falls earlier this month has been arrested in Missouri.

KRCG-TV reports police in Jefferson City, Missouri, ar-rested 20-year-old Sioux Falls resident Christian David Ladin-Villela on Monday. A warrant for his arrest carrying a \$500,000 bond was issued Dec. 14. He faces 10 counts of aggravated assault and discharge of a firearm at an occupied car.

The station reports Ladin-Villela surrendered after members of a SWAT team got inside the home where he was tracked down to.

Police in Sioux Falls have said nobody was hurt when Ladin-Villela shot at the car the night of Dec. 10.

The Grand Island Independent reports that consideration was prompted by the Millard and Seward school districts getting rid of the class ranking system.

Associate Superintendent Robin Dexter said the primary reason for the discussion is that there is a concern that students may be enrolling in courses to boost their rank, regardless of whether those courses align with their college and career plans.

According to Dexter, preliminary research shows that some universities and colleges are moving away from

colleges is they are really looking at that application essay - can a student write?" Dexter said.

Dexter said that the school is looking into whether Latin designations could give colleges an understanding of a student's relative ranking in their graduating class.

Dexter said students already enrolled at the school would not be affected if the class rank was eliminated.

The associate superintendent said she wants to speak with students who graduated from the high school to see if taking Advanced Placement and honors courses to boost their ranking was beneficial for them now that they are in college. Advance Placement and honors courses are weighted, and some colleges give credit to students who pass the Advanced Placement test.

According to Dexter, officials are considering only weighting AP classes and that more definite criteria to determine which students are eligible to take the rigorous courses is needed.

"Some students can't handle the rigor of an AP course," Dexter said. Sophomore Lauren Frankforter,

who is currently ranked No. 1 in her class, said that she plans to take a full slate of Advanced Placement courses, but would favor the school switching to a system of giving students Latin designations.

She said that she also wants to do a focus group with parents about class rank.

A final recommendation on the matter may not come until March.

# **Bids Opening For \$2.5 Million Brown County Jail Improvement**

ABERDEEN (AP) — The final phase of improvements proposed 14 years ago for the Brown County Jail could start in the coming months, officials say.

Brown County commissioners will open bids Tuesday for improvements, including excavating under the three-stall garage to expand the basement and allow for the construction of a larger kitchen.

Commissioner Nancy

Hansen said the county is eager to open bids for the final phase after such a drawn-out process.

"There's a lot of building going on, and this is something we've been working on for many years," Hansen told the Aberdeen American News. "With changes in rates and different needs coming up, things have to change a little bit. But it needs to be done." The county has been saving for the final phase and

will have \$1 million set aside for the work as of next year. Work is estimated to cost about \$2.5 million.

Commissioners have been discussing how to finance the balance of this project and decided to transfer money from the Brown County Landfill enterprise fund. Commission Chairman Duane Sutton said the county will repay the enterprise fund over a seven-year period.

Previous improvements to the jail complex were completed in 2001 and 2007, Brown County Auditor Maxine Fischer said.

In 2001, \$1 million was spent on work that included remodeling of the basement for the city-county dispatch center. In 2007, about \$1.5 million was used for a garage and a recreation area, Fischer said.
