Burglary Arrests Made

Five Yankton Robbery Suspects Are Caught In Mitchell

Five suspects in an armed robbery and a home invasion that took place in Yankton Tuesday night have been arrested in Mitchell.

Hailee Horn, 23; Parkston, Demil Spears, 23, Chicago; Devonjae Strong, 24, Chicago; Jo Thomas, 26, Chicago; and Derrell Williamson, 25, Chicago, were arrested Wednesday morning in connection to the two incidents.

All five have been charged with aggravated assault, first-degree petty theft and commission of a felony with a firearm.

Thomas has the additional charge of grand theft related to a stolen vehicle, and Williamson has a related charge for failing to report as a sex offender.

According to a press release from the Yankton Police Department, a report was received at 9:27 p.m. Tuesday of an attempted home invasion

in the 1200 block of Cedar St. The homeowner was able to scare off three individuals without incident

At 10:31 p.m., residents at an apartment complex in the 1000 block of Walnut St. reported being robbed at gunpoint by four individuals.

An investigation determined that the two incidents were related and the suspects had left

Library Holds Adult Coloring Session To Ease Holiday Stress This Weekend

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These days, Yankton librarian Linda Dobrovolny is working with a different set of books.
What's the library's new addition? Coloring books.

Dobrovolny, who serves as assistant director of the Yankton Community Library, has organized a series of adult coloring sessions. The next rounds are scheduled for 2-4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at the library's meeting room.

The sessions are free with no pre-registration required. Participants must be at least 18 years old, and they can come and go as they please during a particular session.

"This is new for us, but I saw adult coloring books last summer all over the stores. I was seeing it everywhere," she said. "I'm also reading about it in library blogs and newsletters. College libraries are hosting coloring book parties during finals week."

How popular is the craze? People can't get enough of it, according to surveys and a current supply shortage which seems tied to the Christmas season.

"Five of the 20 best-selling books on Amazon in 2015 were adult coloring books," she said. "A (Yankton library) staff member tried to purchase colored pencils for her children and was told it was in short supply. The colored pencils would be back in stock Dec. 26."

The surging popularity of adult coloring books prompted the Yankton library to start the program. The first session was held last month. "We did this previously on the weekend fol-

"We did this previously on the weekend following Thanksgiving," she said. "We purposely chose to do it on holiday weekends. We offer it as a break from the holiday hustle and bustle. Holidays are hard and stressful. We try to provide a space and time for people to take a break."

Dobrovolny acknowledged last month's opening session had a small turnout, which she hopes it grows with more publicity surrounding the coloring books. In addition, the first group
