are helping residents deal physically, emotionally, financially and spiritually with their losses. The Swier Law Firm of Avon is offering free legal advice for those dealing with

insurance claims.
About 70 of the town's 235 residents moved away, leaving the community hit with a reduction in its tax base and utility customers to help pay off infrastructure projects. However, residents have sought to rebound in everyday life by keeping alive such things as the Memorial Day service, Fourth of July celebration, all-school reunion, the kuchen and arts festival, and the old time harvest and tractor festival. The town plans to keep the New Year's Eve Day parade and other festivities.

In October, Delmont voters changed their form of government from an elected mayor with aldermen and wards to an at-large board of trustees who will choose the mayor from among themselves. The changes reflected the difficulty of finding candidates as well as the reduction of wards because of the town's reduced population following the tornado.

Mayor Mae Gunnare anticipates more changes in the months ahead as Delmont continues its recovery. She expressed gratitude for the outpouring of support for her

2. YANKTON HIGH SCHOOL **INTRUDERS**

Two individuals were arrested after intruding on Yankton High School premises on Dec. 3.

University of South Dakota students Adam Gerard (19) from Greenfield, Minnesota, and Joseph Vanbuskirk (18) from Rockford, Minnesota, were found wandering the hallways of YHS.

After a search of the vehicle, Yankton Police Department found weapons and ammunition in the trunk of the car. No weapons were brought into the school, but remained in the vehicle on school

The two USD students were jailed on three misdemeanor charges: trespassing, disruption of school and possession of firearms/dangerous weapons on school property.

As a result, YSD has initiated a locked doors policy and installed security improvements, including a camera and intercom system at the front entrances of each school.

3. YANKTON'S WORLD **ARCHERY TOURNAMENT**

The 2015 World Archery Youth Championships (WAYC) overwhelmed Yankton from June 8-13 at the National Field Archery Association's (NFAA) Easton Yankton Archery Complex.

This international tournament only comes to North America once every six years. WAYC gathered more than 500 archers, ranging from ages 15-20, from 51 countries to take part in competition.

More than 800 volunteers from the area rolled out the red carpet for all archers from the time they got off the plane to the time they

departed. From culture shock, to lost luggage, to language barriers, Yankton and its volunteers provided that Midwestern hospitality that encouraged World Archery to once again choose Yankton as a host city for both the 2018 World Archery Indoor Championships and the 2020 World Archery Field Championships.

4. A DROWNING AT RIVERSIDE PARK

Easter Sunday turned horrifying when 6-year-old Lincoln Hilt of Hurley disappeared while fishing with his family at Riverside Park in Yankton. Authorities searched the river all week amidst challenging April conditions, including rain, cold and fog.

The search reached a tragic end the following Friday when Lincoln's body was found off the shore of the Mis-

souri River. The boy's disappearance led to the weeklong vigil along the river bank by family, friends and even strangers. The worst fears were realized when the little boy's body was recovered from the river. In response, dozens of people gathered Saturday night for a prayer service led by the Rev. Ken Lulf of St. Benedict Catholic Church of Yankton.

The autopsy results indicated the boy drowned and his death was accidental.

Lincoln attended the Viborg-Hurley elementary school, and a memorial service was held at the Hurley school gym.

5. COUNTY'S ROAD, BRIDGE **LEVY REFERRED, REJECTED**

Citing concerns over the county's road system, the Yankton County Commission used a new state provision under the recently passed Senate Bill 1 to unanimously approve a property tax levy of 90 cents per \$1,000 of valuation to help aid in funding of road and bridge improvements. The decision was made by the county

at a special meeting in July. However, the levy ended up being referred to a vote, which took place at the end of September. Commissioners used a set of town hall meetings that had been planned before the commission's levy vote to raise

awareness of the issue. On Sept. 29, the levy failed in a landslide. The final tally was 2,396 voting against (70 percent) and 1,029 (30 percent) voting for the measure. A total of 3,427 ballots were cast. Voter turnout was 24 percent.

County officials, proponents and opponents of the levy have formed a task force that will work through the first few months of 2016 to find a way forward on funding county road and bridge repair.

6. ONWARD YANKTON

On April 1, Onward Yankton announced a contest to find the next big idea for the city. The winning idea would

be awarded \$10,000. The contest ran for 100 days, during which 508 submissions were made.

The submissions were narrowed down to 15, then six finalists. The final ideas included creating a Four Seasons entertainment venue below Chalkstone Hill and making Yankton the best city in America for children.

The winning idea was ultimately Jacob Fokken's make Yankton the Missouri River capital of entrepreneurship. Fokken emphasized having a creative downtown district, including more food, drink and retail establishments, improving housing options, adding activity centers, new parking spaces and making better use of unused space. It also called for business partnering with Mount Marty College.

7. DAKOTA PLAINS COMMITS TO YANKTON COUNTY

As a new Yankton County Commission took over in January, talks resumed to bring a grain sorting facility, run by Dakota Plains, to Yankton County.

As the months went on, officials moved ahead with passing a TIF district to help facilitate the construction of an industrial rail park at Napa Junction northwest of Yankton.

In November, the County Commission agreed to finalize a developer's agreement with Dakota Plains to build a grain sorting facility to act as the ditionally, the county was also approved for a Department of Transportation loan to upgrade Deer Boulevard between Highway 50 and Napa Junction to an industrial quality road.

Construction on the site is planned to begin in 2016.

8. CITY, B-Y WATER STRIKE A DEAL

The city's ability to expand was given a huge boost in May when the City of Yankton and B-Y Water forged a water development agreement.

As the *Press & Dakotan* reported in May, things had been tense between the two parties. For years, a stalemate had

existed B-Y Water and the City of Yankton. B-Y Water controlled the service option for areas outside of Yankton's city limits, which was seen as restricting Yankton's growth potential because it could not expand beyond those limits and provide water service. B-Y had filed a federal lawsuit

against the city in 2007 claiming that its jurisdiction covers all of Yankton County except for the municipal boundaries of the city as they existed before the district's creation in 1977.

The deal, which helped facilitate the construction of the Westbrook Estates project, allows the city to provide water to the development's residents — who will be B-Y customers — until B-Y can adequately serve them.

9. YPD OFFICER INVOLVED **IN SHOOTING**

Following a domestic disturbance call Sept. 1, a suspect was shot in downtown Yankton by a Yankton Police Department officer after it was the suspect threatened to fire on responding officers and raised his gun at the police.

Trae Angel, 19, Yankton, was injured, arrested and subsequently charged with four charges of attempted murder in the first degree. four charges of aggravated assault against a law enforcement officer and one charge of aggravated assault. Angel pleaded not guilty to the charges and a trial date was

set for early January. However, Angel accepted a plea deal in December in which he pleaded guilty to two counts of aggravated assault against law enforcement and one count of aggravated assault. The aggravated assault against a law enforcement officer charges each carry a \$50,000 in fines each while the separate aggravated assault charge carries a 15-year maximum sentence with up to \$30,000 in fines.

Angel is set to be sentenced Jan. 22, 2016.

Meanwhile, Sgt. Jason Foote, who had fired at Angel that night, was cleared in his use of deadly force after a mandatory investigation.

10. SAME-SEX MARRIAGE

On June 26, the U.S. Supreme Court decided to allow same-sex marriage nationwide. This sparked mixed reactions among regional residents while officials in both South Dakota and Nebraska complied with the law.

While the move was controversial, it did not spark massive protests, nor did it produce a stampede of couples applying for licences in the Yankton area. But it generated a lot of conversation that is bound to carry over into 2016 and beyond.


