It's not as easy as simply jumping right back into action without missing a beat. Flack wasn't exactly out of action that whole time, but had practiced live maybe 15 times in the 20 months since Smith and his staff took over.

"That takes time." Smith said. "That takes time to fully trust his knee, to trust

its 6-6 record, presents another significant challenge for USD.

In order to do that, though. USD has to return to the style that resulted in wins over Eastern Washington,

Stanley Morgan Jr. gave Nebraska the lead for good with a one-handed, 22-yard catch in the third quarter and Imani Cross, Terrell Newby and Andy Janovich all ran for scores for the Cornhuskers.

Entering her senior season, Woods ranks sixth in Gazelle history for 3200 meters with a 11:08.32. Breaking the 11-minute barrier would put her in the top four.

In the 1600, Woods currently ranks 13th in Yankton history with a 5:16.8 she clocked in 2014. A clocking of under five minutes would put her in the top five in team history.
