Iowa Gears Up To Stop Stanford QB In Rose Bowl

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Stanford running back Christian McCaffrey did nearly everything it's possible to do with a football in his hands this season, dropping jaws and breaking long-standing NCAA records along the way.

With a big performance in the Rose Bowl on Friday, he might even become famous in Iowa City.

'I hadn't heard too mucȟ about him," Iowa linebacker Cole Fisher said of McCaffrey. "I didn't follow him (before) the Heisman race too much. That was probably the first time I heard about him."

Fisher can be excused for missing those late-starting Pac-12

games. After all, many Heisman Trophy voters undoubtedly did the same during McCaffrey's incredible sophomore season, which concludes with his debut in the Granddaddy of Them All.

The Hawkeyes (12-1) are up to speed on the challenge posed by Stanford's do-it-all back with speed, instinct, a throwing arm and an uncanny knack for turning almost anything into a positive gain. Even after a season spent largely shutting down the best run games in the Big Ten, the Hawkeyes' defense hasn't faced anybody as daunting as McCaffrey.

'You've got to make sure you know where he's at, (because) he's at the quarterback, he's at wide receiver, they put him in the

backfield," Iowa defensive coordinator Phil Parker said. "It's going to be hard. It's going to be a good competition for us.

Although Alabama's Derrick Henry won the Heisman, McCaffrey won The Associated Press' player of the year award last week — and his accomplishments are stunning by any measure.

McCaffrey ran for 1,847 yards, led Stanford (11-2) with 41 receptions for 540 yards and returned kicks while setting the NCAA record for all-purpose yards. Most recently, he turned in a 461-yard performance against Southern California in the Pac-12 title game.

Stanford offensive coordinator Mike Bloomgren knows which award voters make sense to him.

"We think (the Heisman voters) got it wrong," Bloomgren said. "We think the AP got it right. I texted him as soon as the AP (award) came out, and I was like, 'Well, at least we've got one of those things right.' He fired back with: 'I guess AP stands for "all purpose," because at least they like my all-

After a few weeks of watching McCaffrey on film, Parker seems inclined to agree with the AP voters.

purpose yards.'

"People bounce off him," Parker said. "You see guys hitting him, and he doesn't go down. You'd better be able to wrap him up, and we've got to do a better job of that."

Yet Parker believes his defense is capable of challenging McCaffrey and his imposing offensive line.

The Cardinal scored 37.2 points per game and dominated time of pos-

session all season long.

"It's going to take all 11 people on defense running to the ball, Iowa defensive back Jordan Lomax said. "(McCaffrey) is a great back. It's going to start with our D-line up front to get after their offensive line. Their offensive line is built just like our offense. It's going to come down to who dominates the run game."

Iowa's defense is a study in simplicity, according to coaches and players on both sides of the

Cougars Claim Tourney Title

VERDIGRE, Neb. — An early-season loss to Elgin Public-Pope John had the Niobrara-Verdigre boys looking for balance.

They feel like they've found it.

Senior post Cade Kalkowski scored 19 points and guards Christian Swalley and Ricky Bickerstaff scored 16 and 10 points as the Cougars edged Osmond 58-55 in the boys' championship of the Verdigre Booster Club Holiday Tournament on Wednesday in Verdigre, Nebraska.

The win propelled the Cougars to 8-1 on the season with their seventh straight victory.

"We knew this was going to be a test," said Cougars head coach Todd Runnels. 'We knew these guys would bring a good game.'

The Cougars' top four scorers - two inside and two outside - combined for 54 of 58 points on the night. That balance is something the Cougars have worked for, Runnels said.

"In our loss to Elgin (Public-Pope John), we went 4-29 from three-point," he said. "Since then (our guards) have learned to use our big guys more. It's helped balance us out."

Brock Johnson scored 19 points and Cole Moes had 15 points for Osmond (4-2), which saw its four-game win streak snapped. Tucker Timmerman added 10 points for the Tigers.

"They were tough to stop," Runnels said. "Their high post game was causing us problems."

The Cougars used their balance to score the game's first seven points, then saw Osmond answer with the next seven. It took a 10-2 run midway through the first half for Niobrara-Verdigre to build a 24-17 lead.

But Osmond erased that lead as well, scoring nine straight points to tie the game at 28.

Bloomfield Moves To 5-3

VERDIGRE, Neb. — Bloomfield's Sarah Casteneda scored her 28th and 29th points with four seconds left. lifting the Queen Bees to a 54-53 come-from-behind victory over host Niobrara-Verdigre in the girls' championship of the Verdigre Booster Club Holiday Tournament, held Wednesday in Verdigre, Nebraska.

Castaneda also had 14 rebounds for the Queen Bees, who take a 5-3 record into January. Bloomfield won just eight games in the 2014-15

"It's great," Castaneda said of the team's start. "We want to keep building on it, keep winning.

Emily Knust scored 21 points and Ashley Guenther had 11 points for Niobrara-Verdigre (2-7).

The Queen Bees gave Niobrara-Verdigre a steady dose of Castaneda in the first half, as the 5-10 junior scored 13 of Bloomfield's first 20 points. Two more three-pointers in the second quarter — the second beating the halftime buzzer gave the Queen Bees a 30-22 halftime edge.

'Sarah is a phenomenal player," said Bloomfield head coach Terry Mlady. "Tonight we saw the '32' we had thought we'd see all season."

But after Bloomfield scored first in the second half, the Cougars surged back. Niobrara-Verdigre used a steady dose of inside baskets by Knust and Guenther to score 13 straight points and take a 35-32 lead.

Bloomfield surged back to regain a 47-42 lead, but the Cougars again attacked the basket to score. An 11-3 run late in the game gave Niobrara-Verdigre a 53-50 edge.

An Amber Bruegeman basket pulled the Queen Bees within one, setting up the game-winning possession. Castaneda got the ball on the blocks and powered the ball in, drawing a foul. The free throw was missed, but the Cougars' last-second attempt hit the backboard and fell harmlessly to the

"They did the things we practice every day," Mlady said. "We wanted it in Sarah's hands. She's been a gamechanger.'

Bloomfield will now look to ride the momentum of its three-game win streak into Saturday's matchup with another Class C2 opponent, Laurel-Concord-Coleridge.
