A subcommittee is currently working with the issue, but Hunhoff said one of the problems is nobody seems to know how many phantom FTEs there are.

"I don't think anyone in the Legislature really knows, if we should cut some, how many we should cut," he said.

Sen. Hunhoff said the issue lies in the fact that, for some offices, the FTEs have been their contingency funding.

"If something happens in South Dakota, and you need extra dollars, you can't go to the budget reserve, you can't go to the property tax relief fund, you can't go any place and say, 'This crisis happened, and I need that money,'" she said.

The reason they can't do this is because that money has been appropriated, Sen. Hunhoff said.

"So what departments have done over the years is, they've left a few positions open that might not have been needed," she said. "We appropriated for those positions, but they didn't

use those dollars. But it was their contingency if something happened, so now we've caught onto that.

"If we take that all away and something happens in that department, how do they respond? I'm not saying it's right or wrong. I'm concerned we don't have a contingency fund if something does happen, that there's nothing out there," she said.

Saturday's cracker barrel was sponsored by the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce's Governmental Affairs Committee. The next Chamber-sponsored forum is Feb. 20 at the Avera Professional Pavilion.

going to be with him. I'm doing my news, except I'm maybe going to be a little more involved."

The only real change is that Pfund will be taking donations for area Catholic schools. These can be sent to the station or dropped off. Donations by check must be made out to a specific school.

"If you want to drop it off in the middle of the night, call me," Pfund said. "I will be more than happy to take your donation. If you're more comfortable during the daytime or, if you want to, you can call it in on the overnight and what I might do is just have you bring it in the next morning. I'll write it down, just to be on the safe side."

"The only reason I want them sent here instead of to the school is I want to be the clearinghouse," he said.

Once the totals have been made, he will present the donations to the schools himself.

Pfund has done several marathon sessions in the past, and said the way he prepares is

to schedule his guests in advance.

Sleep is important, too.

"Monday I'll be on doing my news, I'll record my noon news, but at 9 o'clock they're sending me home to go sleep, and I'll sleep from about 9 to 5," he said.

"I'll be nervous, and I'll hit the ground running. I'll try to pace myself, and try not to get myself too keyed up. The adrenaline will be flowing, but I've done this enough to where, by about noon Tuesday ... I think is when it's going to hit. That's when I have to remember, 'OK, six more hours.'"

Pfund said he's looking forward to the experience, especially the overnight aspect, which is how his career in radio began. He said overnights can be interesting because of the people who are listening at that time, either at work or because they can't sleep.

He said the longest he's ever been on the radio is approximately 60 hours, which happened as the result of being snowed in at a station in Nebraska.

"I was doing everything," Pfund said. "I was the weather guy, news, and the thing about that station was we signed off at midnight, but the phone kept

ringing. I finally had to stop answering the phone. I needed to get some sleep. Finally on Sunday ... they brought a tractor in and they got me pulled out."

He said he's also thought about going for the world record of continuous airtime, which is 120 hours.

"I'm stupid enough to try it," he said, laughing.

Pfund thanked everyone at the station for allowing him to take on the challenge, and for helping him gain skill in his profession. "Everybody here has really welcomed me, but they have helped me improve immensely as a broadcaster," he said. "I am a lot better broadcaster than I was coming in here."

Although he's raising funds for Catholic Schools Week, Pfund said he would do the same for any area school or community, including his hometown, Coleridge.

He said that although he has a goal in mind as to how much he wants to raise, he did not want to say its amount.

"I know with the economic times, it's tough, because I know there's a lot of things going on," Pfund said. "But I know God will provide."
