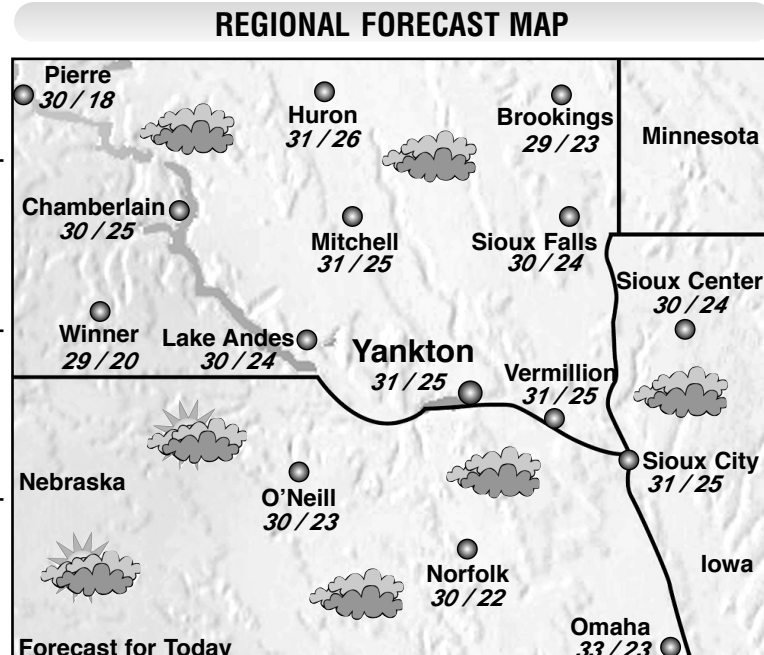

**50 YEARS AGO**  
Friday, February 5, 1960  
• One sailor was killed and five others were believed to have drowned Thursday when the destroyer Daly rolled sharply during sea trials in the Atlantic, 200 miles off the Virginia coast. The Navy said 11 men were washed overboard by waves which swept the destroyer, but that six were rescued.  
• The Warsaw Pact powers have lined up behind Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev for a showdown on the German problem at the East-West summit talks in May. The eight-nation Communist alliance wound up a one-day conference Thursday night by threatening again to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany "and to solve on this basis the question of West Berlin as well."

**CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE**  
Agriculture futures were mixed Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.  
Wheat for March delivery jumped 6.75 cents to \$4.7575 a bushel, while March corn gained 1 cent to \$3.54 a bushel and soybeans for March delivery climbed 6 cents to \$9.14 a bushel. March oats lost 2.25 cents to \$2.2875 a bushel.  
Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.  
February live cattle added 0.1 cent to 86.55 cents a pound; March feeder cattle slipped 0.15 cent to 97.25 cents a pound; February lean hogs inched up 0.03 cent to 66.15 cents a pound; and February pork bellies fell 0.3 cent to 81.75 cents a pound.

sides of it. Then, the campers tunnel in and dig out until they reach the sticks.  
"That way, they get a uniform dome shape so it's safe to be in," Sage said. "It's basically an igloo that they scoop out, in a sense."  
Assistant Scoutmaster Kevin Kuhl said the quizees stay "surprisingly warm," about 28 degrees.  
Zach Sage added that overnight, the scouts stay warm by "shaking up a lot of hand-warmers and putting them in your sleeping bag, and (wearing) lots of layers."  
Todd Sage said a thick pad is also required, to prevent heat from absorbing into the ground, especially for the scouts who choose to sleep outside of the quizees, using a multi-layer sleeping bag and a tarp for covering.  
John Iverson, 15, said staying warm overnight gets easier every year.  
"You know what to do, and more of what not to do," he said. Kuhl said adequate clothing is the most important aspect of staying warm.

"You adapt and you dress properly and take your layers," he said. "We always talk about layering your system. So you take off layers as you sweat coming in, you warm up pretty good, down to shirtsleeves for some guys. And then you start putting them back on as you cool down."  
"It's surprising how cold you don't get," he said.  
Sage said the winter campouts aren't as regimented as some of the other trips the troop goes on.  
"Each boy tries to build his own fire and cook his own food," he said. "It's (about) seeing who can be independent. The leaders are down there basically for support and to keep them out of trouble in case something goes wrong. But most of the time, it's just to test the skills we've been teaching them."  
The scouts hone those skills up to a month in advance to make sure they are adequately prepared, he added.  
"In our troop meetings, we'll go over winter survival, and stuff that they need to learn — just all the odds and ends they need to know to basically survive in that kind of environment," Sage said.  
That preparation was more than warranted for the 17 boys and 10 adults who attended, as the temperatures reached six degrees below zero Friday night.  
"I think seven of the boys were new, and five of the adults were new, so there was a lot of anxiety — especially on the adults' side — of going into an environment that they're not familiar with and surviving it," Sage said. "This is the first time we've actually taken a female with us, and she survived perfectly. She was questioning it herself, why she was doing it. But after the first night, you know you can do it after that."  
Kuhl said the trip also helps the scouts prepare for the yearly Klondike Derby — a district-wide outdoor campout — which will be held later this month.  
"Also, it's a good training exercise because when we do go into the wilderness areas in Colorado and Wyoming for a week-long backpacking trip, getting and going to the car just isn't an option," Kuhl said.  
The trip is really about working together, he added.  
"I enjoy being out there and watching the camaraderie between the scouts, because if anybody is in trouble, we're all in trouble," Kuhl said. "The over-riding theme here is, we all take care of each other and get through the weekend together."
