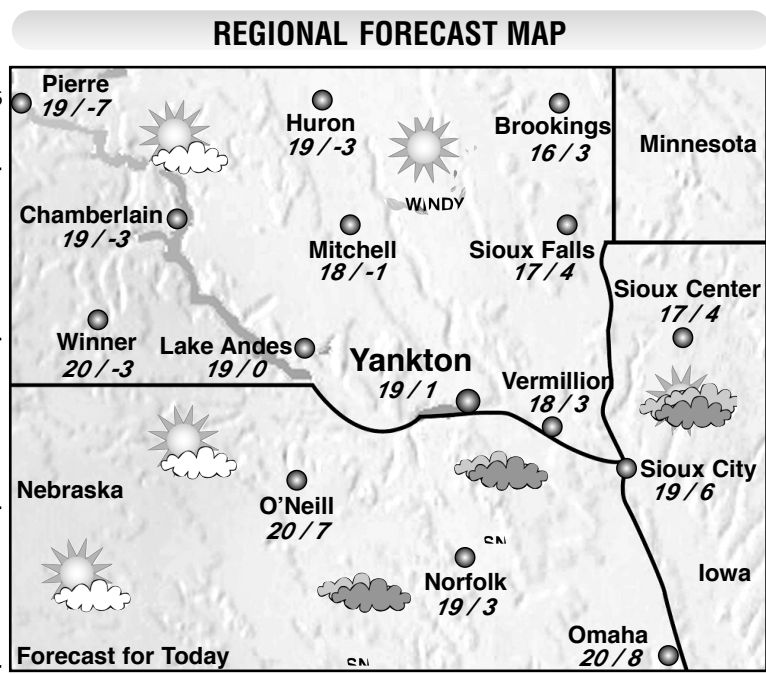

run. I don't know where Dick Cheney has been. Look, it's one thing, again, to criticize. It's another thing to sort of rewrite history. What is he talking about?"

Cheney did not answer directly, instead insisting that Biden was "dead wrong" to assert that a fresh Sept. 11-style strike was unlikely, calling a nuclear or biological attack by al-Qaida "the biggest strategic threat the United States faces today."

Even so, Cheney appeared to dial back the rhetoric, acknowledging that the Bush administration too was divided on whether terror suspects should be charged and tried in federal civilian courts or taken before military tribunals.

"I can remember," Cheney said, "a meeting in the Roosevelt Room in the West Wing of the White House where we had a major shootout" — one that he said he lost — about civilian versus military trials for terrorist captives.

"We never clearly or totally resolved those issues. These are tough questions, no doubt about it," he said on ABC's "This Week."

Biden got in the first links on NBC's "Meet the Press" in an interview taped late Saturday in Canada, where he was attending the Vancouver Olympic Games. On Cheney's assault on the Obama administration, Biden said "his assertions are not accurate."

Cheney demurred on that allegation, choosing instead to take on again Obama's decision to close the U.S. military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

In doing so, he admitted for a second time that he had been at odds with the majority of Bush administration officials on the decision to release prisoners from the military lockup to their home country when cases against them were determined to be legally untenable.

"I didn't think that releasing anybody was the right thing to do, unless you had evidence that, you know, there was a mistake of some kind," Cheney said.

On Afghanistan and Obama's decision to increase U.S. forces in the 8-year-old war, Cheney gave Obama high marks. But he derided Biden for giving the Obama administration credit for winding down the war in Iraq without acknowledging the work of President George W. Bush.

'Socialism' Forum At Farber Hall Feb. 17

VERMILLION — "Kill Socialism?" will be the topic of the Feb. 17 Noon International Forum to be held in the University of South Dakota's Farber Hall in Vermillion. The event is sponsored by the Beacom School of Business.

Scheduled panelists include Dr. Mike Allgrun (economics), Dr. John Fremstad (political science) and Joachim Hurth (visiting Business School professor from Ostfalia University in Wolfsburg, Germany. The moderator is Dr. Benno Wymar (economics).

Earlier last year, during a political event in Sioux Falls, young people were asked to wear T-shirts with the slogan "Kill Socialism!" To do that would mean the end of public schools and changing interstate highways 29 and 90 into toll roads. Would the bridges crossing the Missouri in Vermillion and Yankton become toll bridges? Former President George W. Bush had already suggested changing Social Security into a tax credit to be invested into the stock market. Medicare would obviously have to be changed as well. Is the U.S. really ready for such changes?

This event is open to the public.

Property Owners Must Clear Sidewalks

The City of Yankton reminds property owners that public sidewalks are to be kept clear of snow and ice. Snow removed from driveways, sidewalks or parking lots cannot be placed in the streets.

Survey To Focus On Internet Access And Use

LINCOLN, Neb. — A statewide survey will ask Nebraska residents how they are using the Internet and the technology needs of their household.

Letters were mailed on Feb. 8 notifying about 6,600 households in Nebraska that they had been randomly selected to participate in the survey.

The Nebraska Public Service Commission was awarded a grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration for conducting a study of broadband use and needs in Nebraska. The survey includes questions about Nebraskans' current use of technology, their opinions about community technology resources, and technology training needs.

"Results from the survey will inform federal, state and local policy makers about how Nebraskans are currently using technology, what barriers remain that prevent households from adopting broadband Internet service, and the input will guide the development and provision of educational opportunities for residents to better utilize current technologies," stated Jerry Vap, Chairman of the Commission.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is conducting the survey for the Commission. In addition, the Nebraska Information Technology Commission Community Council (NITC) and Nebraska Department of Economic Development (DED) collaborated with the Commission on this survey.

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She started all 35 games last season, when the Jackrabbits advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Iverson has started 14 of 21 games for USD this season, and has averaged 6.3 points and 4.2 rebounds a game for the Coyotes, who are 10-11 overall and 3-3 in the Great West Conference.

Though tonight's game will not count toward league standings and each team is in the middle of its conference schedule, the desire to beat the Jackrabbits will be strong, according to Iverson.

"We're all taking it pretty seriously," she said. "I doubt there's as much pressure because it's a non-conference game, but we still want to beat them."

Though SDSU and USD have faced each other in such sports as swimming and track since 2004, the two schools have not met in the higher profile sports basketball or football. The Coyotes are set to join the Summit League in 2012-13, but that conference does not offer football.

Because of their busy schedules with basketball and class-

work, Cornemann and Iverson do not get to see each other as much anymore, they both said.

Cornemann said there will be chances before and after tonight's game to catch up with Iverson.

But once the clock starts running, all that is set aside.

And that is a sentiment Johnston said he agrees with. "All the players on our team played against each other in high school, so there are going to be a lot of personal feelings there," Johnston said. "Once it gets going, they'll think about winning more."

Though the names and faces (including the coach for the Coyotes, now led by second-year man Ryan Williams) have changed, the State-U rivalry was one dominated by the Jackrabbits until the very end.

SDSU won 27 of the final 29 games against USD, yet despite that trend, Cornemann said she thinks the real impact won't be determined by the outcome.

"A game like this just gets people excited about basketball, especially women's basketball," she said. "Everyone will enjoy the game. It'll bring a lot of attention to the sport."

anyone who was wrongfully taken off the rolls that their name is put back on, not just the two plaintiffs who are named in the case."

Janis and Colhoff were sentenced early in 2008 to five years probation and ordered to pay restitution of \$22,140 and \$29,156, respectively, for convictions of theft from an Indian tribal organization. Colhoff, ex-payroll supervisor for the Oglala Sioux Tribe, pleaded guilty.

Former vice president Janis pleaded not guilty and was con-

victed in a jury trial in federal court.

According to the lawsuit, neither knew their name had been removed from the voter registration list until they went to vote: Colhoff in the June 2008 primary and Janis in the November 2008 election.

In addition to unspecified monetary damages, the lawsuit asks that any voter improperly removed from the registration list be reinstated, that federal observers be stationed at polling places, that the state educate and train poll workers and election officials, and that people be allowed to cast a provisional ballot when their voting rights are questioned.

USD Student Hospitalized After Fall At Frat House

VERMILLION (AP) — A University of South Dakota student has been hospitalized following a fall at a fraternity house.

The university has not identified the student, but a spokesperson said he remains in intensive care at a Sioux Falls hospital.

The student reportedly fell down a flight of stairs at the Sigma Nu house on Wednesday night.

The fraternity president told the campus newspaper the student suffered a head injury.
