Jackrabbits and restored their energy for the second half.

"Ketty's big shots there at the end of the half were relaxing," said SDSU head coach Aaron Johnston. "Ketty's three before half was big, and as the game went on, we settled down defensively."

"It was really huge for us to hit that run at the end of the half," said SDSU senior Maria Boever. "It brought us out with that energy for the second half."

After USD's Roche cued for three and Hegge knocked down a pair of free throws, SDSU continued to build the lead in the second half.

Alison Anderson swished a 3-pointer, Maria Boever followed with a traditional 3-point play and Kristin Rotert sank from downtown, and SDSU's lead ballooned to 44-29.

The Coyotes answered with a Hegge basket in the lane and Case following her shot with a lay-in. Iverson swished a jump-shot and USD trailed 45-35 with 9:10 remaining.

An 8-0 run pushed SDSU's lead to 53-36 with 6:09 to play.

Jill Young dishd to Kristin Rotert following a mad scramble and Sunnarborg put back on offensive rebound to restore order on the Jackrabbit side. Boever scored on a breakout, and the Jacks led 53-36.

The closest the Coyotes got was within 55-43 as Roche rolled

in a lay-up with 2:59 to play. SDSU converted seven of eight free throws in the final 2:17 to seal the 67-48 non-conference win.

The Jacks, who are tied for first in the Summit League with an 11-3 mark, escaped with the win and turn their attention to wrapping up their Summit League schedule with four games, including at first-place mates Oakland Feb. 22.

"We were actually tight for a good part of the game, you could sense there was a bit more pressure on us during the shoot-around today," said Johnston. "We played exceptionally hard, though, and we began to hit some shots we weren't hitting at the beginning of the game; making shots is the cure-all."

Rotert led SDSU with 14 points while Boever added 13 points. Michelson had 11 points and Cornemann finished with 10 points.

Roche led USD (10-12) with 12 points and six rebounds while Iverson and Jasmine Mosley each scored eight points. Kinder finished with nine points.

The USD fans reacted to a call on the floor with chant of profanity, but the nee rivalry, which commences in earnest in 2011-2012 when USD joins the Summit League, was ushered in with a friendly dignity.

"Both sides, starting with the admissions, deserve a lot of credit because they wanted it handled professionally," said Johnston. "It was a good start to a new rivalry."

"It went really well," said Cornemann. "A couple of chants might have been inappropriate, but it went really well and I was

impressed with how our student body handled themselves."

With the rivalry game behind his Coyotes, Williams can prepare for a Great West Conference home tilt against Utah Valley Thursday night, but competing in the Summit is the ultimate future goal.

"We've got to get some D-1 size and we've got to get in the weight-room and get stronger," said Williams. "I thought our kids competed well."

Paulsen's effort helped the Gazelles cut the Stevens lead to 41-39 headed into the fourth quarter. The Gazelles tied the score at 43-43 with 6:20 left in the game as Cornemann added two free-throws, but they could never regain the lead.

On the possession after Cornemann hit her free-throws, Wright answered back with a 3-pointer to give Stevens a 46-43 lead. After Yankton failed to score on their next possession, Erica Peterson hit two free-throws to push the lead to five points at 48-43 with 5:38 remaining.

After Paulsen drove baseline and scored on a lay-up for Yankton, Gabby Haefs banked in a 3-pointer just moments before the shot clock expired to put the Raiders up 51-45 with 4:30 to play.

Haefs, a freshman, scored nine points for the Raiders. "I was really happy with Gabby Haefs," Deboer said. "We brought her up on varsity a couple games ago because of injuries and she has done a great job for us."

Paulsen kept her motor turning as she scored all five of Yankton remaining points. However, her last basket came at the 3:12 mark of the fourth quarter and left the Gazelles down 53-50.

"I think we had a few lapses in our execution and a couple missed opportunities down the stretch," Pesicka said. "The loss was discouraging for Yankton who had won their last

two games before playing Stevens.

"I think we had a lot of nice things today," Pesicka said. "Rapid City has a nice team and they are quick."

The Gazelles will travel to Mitchell on Friday. The Kernels won the previous meeting between the clubs, 59-47 on Jan. 12 in Yankton.

point advantage. Two Raider turnovers in the final 34 seconds helped seal the outcome.

Hay noted that while the Raiders gave themselves an opportunity to win, they need to play better early to avoid getting in a hole.

"We've been playing better when we're down 10," he said. "We have to put ourselves in better position to win."

Drotzmann scored 14 points and grabbed six rebounds for Yankton. Frick finished with 10 points off the bench, including eight in the first half. Groetken and Walsh each had nine points,

with Walsh grabbing a team-high seven rebounds. Berry had a game-high six assists in the victory.

"From the beginning our offense played pretty well," Gross said. "We were more patient in the second half and made good things happen when we needed them to."

Yankton finished with 19 points of bench scoring, the second straight contest in which over a third of the scoring came from outside the first five.

"That's what we need out of those guys," Gross noted. "We want to make other teams have to defend our bench personnel."

Brisk finished with 24 points, including 15 in the fourth quarter, and Wevik scored 20 points, shooting 6-9 from outside. Brisk and Zach Bedard each had seven rebounds.

"We just didn't have an answer for Brisk in the fourth quarter," Gross noted. "Wevik was unbelievable from three-point."

Yankton, 6-10 and winners of back-to-back games for just the second time this season, host Mitchell Friday and Aberdeen Central Saturday. The Bucks' final five games, counting Monday's win, will be played at the Summit Center.

"We played well against both those teams (Mitchell and Aberdeen Central)," Gross noted. "Hopefully the momentum from these last two games motivate us to play well, compete harder and get those wins."

Stevens, 2-14, begins the home stretch with games against Rapid City Central Thursday and Spearfish Friday. Rapid City Central ranks first in District

4AA, while Stevens and Spearfish are battling for fourth place in the district. The winner may still be able to catch Douglas for the third seed.
