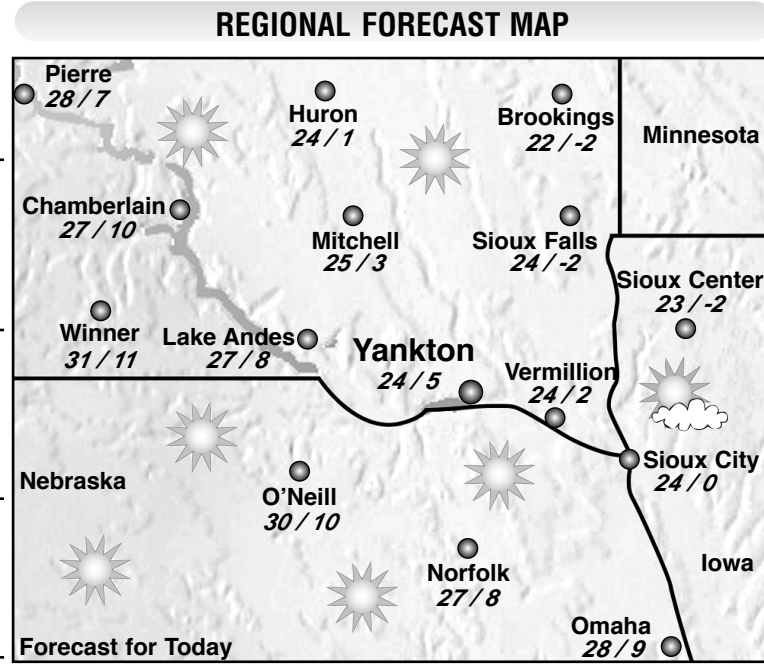

Agriculture futures advanced Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for March delivery climbed 18.5 cents to \$5.05 a bushel, while March corn gained 5.75 cents to \$3.6725 a bushel and oats for March delivery rose 3.25 cents to \$2.36 a bushel. March soybeans jumped 20.5 cents to \$9.655 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures traded higher and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

April live cattle added 1.4 cents to 92.17 cents a pound; March feeder cattle rose 1.37 cents to \$1.0112 a pound; April lean hogs inched up 0.07 cent to 68.27 cents a pound; and March pork bellies slipped 0.4 cent to 83.6 cents a pound.

who promoted the ban passed last year, said the Legislature should stick with the complete ban, which would protect people from health problems caused by smoke.

If both smoking measures were on the ballot and both passed, a court would probably have had to determine which took precedence, Stalley said.

Supporters of the second measure said voters should be given an option to allow smoking in rooms separated from non-smokers. If the complete ban passes, revenue shared by casinos and the state is likely to drop by 20 percent, they said.

Owners of video lottery casinos in North Sioux City said the complete ban would cause many of their customers to drive a few miles to Iowa casinos that allow smoking.

An eruption of tempers and fists Tuesday turned a sitdown demonstration by Negro students at a segregated lunch counter into a short but bloody brawl. One white youth was temporarily hospitalized with a "slashed face" — probably done with a razor — police said. Three Negro students were arrested, all charged with disorderly conduct.

Roy Ryken Jr., young Utica farmer, was killed when his truck was hit by a Milwaukee railroad train in Utica at about 10:30 a.m. today. It was learned just before press time. Roy Ryken, Sr., father of the victim, was also killed in a highway accident west of the state hospital about three weeks ago, when his car struck a highway maintainer.

tourism and business testified against it.

Business owners already are paying more in Health Department inspection fees, the tourism sales tax and an unemployment benefits surcharge, said Michelle Brich, lobbying for the South Dakota Innkeepers Association.

"When proponents talk about a year in which we're desperate for revenue, frankly so are many,

many small businesses throughout the state," said Shawn Lyons, of the South Dakota Retailers Association.

Some committee members said the tax revenue would be helpful to local governments during a poor economy, while others said the poor economy is reason not to remove the tax exemption.

State Rep. Bernie Hunhoff, D-Yankton, said the bill is well-intentioned and may be worthy of consideration some other time.

"For this year we just need to do no harm to the small-business community," he said.
