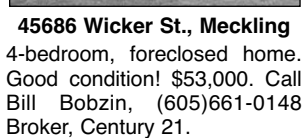

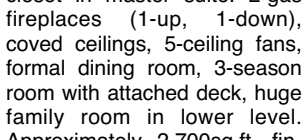

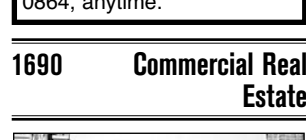

Man Gets Life For Watertown Stabbing Death

WATERTOWN (AP) — A man convicted in the stabbing death of his ex-girlfriend in Watertown has been sentenced to life in prison with no chance of parole.

Twenty-two-year-old David Amotun was sentenced Wednesday for murdering 18-year-old Brandy Cotton. A jury last month found him guilty of second-degree murder and grand theft.

Amotun was arrested in Sioux Falls the morning after the January 2009 killing following a chase in a stolen pickup truck. Cotton's body was found in her grandmother's home.

That's because most legal residents are expected to continue to get Medicaid-covered prenatal care. Despite barring coverage for yet-to-be-born children, the federal government allows them to be included in family-size counts that help determine whether pregnant women receive Medicaid coverage.

But illegal immigrants are barred from receiving Medicaid so none is expected to receive Medicaid.

Panel Deadlocks On Tribal Gambling Measure

PIERRE — The South Dakota Legislature should have a say in approving any state agreement with an Indian tribe that allows expansion of gambling in a tribal casino, Senate Republican Leader Dave Knudson of Sioux Falls said Wednesday.

State law says tribes cannot operate casinos unless they negotiate compacts with the governor. Knudson asked a Senate committee to support his proposal to require legislative approval of any compact allowing a tribal casino to add more slot machines or operate in a new location.

After representatives of several Indian tribes opposed the measure, the State Affairs Committee was unable to pass the bill or kill it. A series of votes resulted in 4-4 ties, so the panel deferred the bill until Friday, when the panel's ninth member may be available to vote.

Knudson, a gambling opponent who is seeking the Republican nomination for governor, said approval from both the governor and the Legislature should be required for any compact allowing expansion of tribal gambling. He said the measure would improve the balance of power between the executive and legislative branches of government.

However, representatives of several tribes said the measure apparently is

intended to make it tougher for tribes to add more slot machines and card games. Gov. Mike Rounds has refused to negotiate compacts allowing tribes to have more slot machines, and adding 105 legislators to the process would make negotiations even more difficult, they said.

Under federal law, tribes can offer the same kinds of games offered elsewhere in a state after negotiating compacts with the state. Sioux tribes in South Dakota can run casinos because the state legalized gambling in the Black Hills city of Deadwood. Eight of the state's nine tribes have casinos.

Fred Assam, a lawyer for the Flandreau Santee Sioux, said tribes have been restricted to 250 gaming devices in each casino since 1990. In the meantime, the number of slot machines and card games in Deadwood has grown from 860 to nearly 3,800, he said.

The Flandreau Santee Sioux sued the state in federal court, arguing that the governor hasn't negotiated in good faith. Sen. Russell Olson, R-Madison, said the Legislature shouldn't change the rules while the lawsuit is pending in court, and he predicted the tribe will win the lawsuit and get authority to have more slot machines.

Sen. Jim Bradford, R-Pine Ridge, said the Oglala Sioux's casinos provide valuable jobs on a reservation with high unemployment. "I'm very sorry the governor has seen fit not to negotiate," Bradford said. "But I don't want to complicate it."

Nebraska Lawmakers To Tackle Prenatal-Care Issue

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska lawmakers on Wednesday cleared the way for a bill that would keep state-funded health insurance coverage for prenatal care from being cut off for pregnant, illegal immigrants and possibly some legal residents.

The 36-0 vote allowing a bill to be introduced this late in the legislative session was a reaction to notification by the federal government that Nebraska had been breaking federal rules by allowing unborn children — not just their mothers — to qualify for Medicaid. The official end of bill introduction was about a month ago.

"For over 30 years, we have said unborn children are Nebraskans and entitled to benefits," said Sen. Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha. "Now we need to make the decision whether we want to continue that policy."

Panel Resists Changes In Redistricting

PIERRE (AP) — South Dakota lawmakers on Wednesday refused to make changes in the process of drawing up new legislative districts after the 2010 Census.

A House committee rejected a bill to create a seven-member commission that would prepare a plan for lawmakers to consider. It killed another bill to create single-member House districts. Each district now has two state representatives.

The proposals are not new. Both were defeated in the Legislature last year. The Legislature draws new district boundaries every 10 years to account for population shifts. Each of the 35 districts is supposed to contain a nearly equal number of voters.

Neb. Advances Underage Drinking Bill

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska lawmakers are on track to give teens another reason to stop drinking alcohol.

On Wednesday, they gave first-round approval to a bill (LB258) that would give judges the option of suspending the driver's licenses of people 18 and under when they are convicted of minor-in-possession.

Lawmakers said teens now view the convictions as badges of honor. Sen. John Harms of Scottsbluff introduced the bill and had wanted licenses to automatically be suspended.

But critics say teens can be convicted of the crime just for being at parties where there is alcohol, even though they may not be drinking.

Under the bill, a license could be suspended anywhere from a month to a year, depending on how many minor-in-possession convictions one had.

S.D. Golf Cart Bill Advances To Senate

PIERRE (AP) — The South Dakota Senate will take up a bill giving towns the authority to allow the use of golf carts on city streets.

Municipalities would issue a permit for the carts and could set other conditions for their use. The carts would not be allowed on state or county highways except to cross them.

The bill's sponsor said it would work well for people who want to drive between home and the golf course, or for those who want to drive elsewhere in town.

Grant To Pay For Highway Upgrade

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Sen. Tim Johnson says South Dakota's Transportation Department is getting a \$10 million federal stimulus grant for a highway project.

The South Dakota Democrat says the money is to reconstruct and make safety improvements on U.S. Highway 18 between Oglala and Pine Ridge.

The federal government is releasing stimulus money for transportation projects across the country.

Ex-S.D. First Lady To Run For Auditor

PIERRE (AP) — A former South Dakota first lady says she will seek the Republican nomination to run for state auditor.

Patricia Miller of Fort Pierre is president of the South Dakota Heritage Fund, the nonprofit partner to the State Historical Society. She also has worked for the state Social Services Department and is a former chief executive of Easter Seals of South Dakota.

Miller served as South Dakota's first lady for her husband, Gov. Walter D. Miller, in the mid-1990s.

Democratic state Sen. Julie Bartling also has said she is running for auditor.

The current auditor, Rich Sattgast, cannot run for reelection because he is term-limited.
