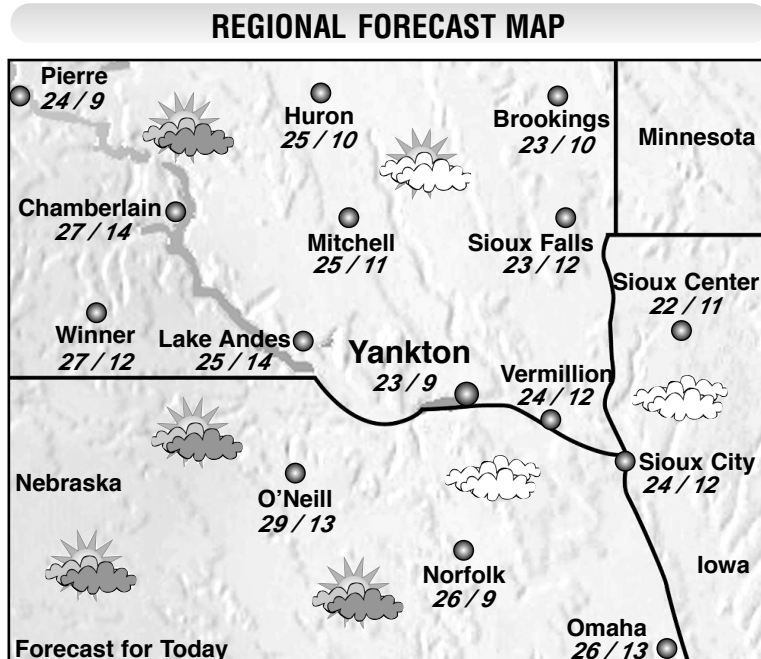

Heartened by the Supreme Court's decision in the gold cases, the Senate "money bloc" started a new move today to drive down the value of the dollar. Inflationists forces gathered behind an amendment to the pending \$4,880,000,000 work and relief bill.  
Bruno Hauptmann's urgent plea for prompt action on an appeal from his death sentence stirred up a controversy among his attorneys today and presaged an open break with Edward J. Reilly, chief defense counsel.

"What you can do with the form-based codes is pull together the elements so we get a cohesive place in which we can work with all these different entities to pull together in unison rather than allowing ideas to kind of bounce around out there," Garrity said. "We know that's what's happening in that corridor right now. We've got a lot of various actions going on down there where no one is working together to get something that blends together."  
Although form-based codes were not used along Yankton's Second Street, the similar themes used for the Eisenbraun & Associates building and the National Park Service building are an example of what can occur with such ordinances, according to Garrity. He said the architecture of the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce building, with its use of native stone, or the maritime features of the Dairy Dock along Highway 52 are examples of possible themes that could be adopted for the area to make it more cohesive.

As a child, Garrity said he was always impressed with Fort Yankton, a historically-themed development that once stood west of the city.  
"If we had taken that concept back then and run up the corridor with it, what would we have had now?" Garrity asked. "I think we could have ended up with something that could have been a major attraction. So now, can we come up with something? What we would like to do is start taking this out to the public and get them talking to see what ideas people have."  
Garrity said he anticipates it could take three years from the time the public hearings are initiated to the time a plan is adopted. Along the way, he hopes to include stakeholders in the area on a steering committee and employ a consultant to illustrate the plans conceived by locals.  
With the development of recreational trails in the area, Garrity said he is convinced it could become a major tourism draw if the correct planning is done. If sedimentation continues down the Missouri River to this area, waterfowl hunting could also be the source of economic development.  
Garrity agreed with County Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen that one of the major hurdles to development will be getting a sewer line extended to the area.  
"I know it costs money, but we might have to come to the plate and help to get that going," Jensen said.  
Yankton Mayor Dan Specht said he thought Garrity's presentation was "excellent."  
Garrity said he is excited to speak with the public about the possibilities for the corridor and wants to put his best foot forward.  
"This is something the community is going to make happen," he said. "Planning is something we haven't put into place on our corridor. Now is the time to do it."
