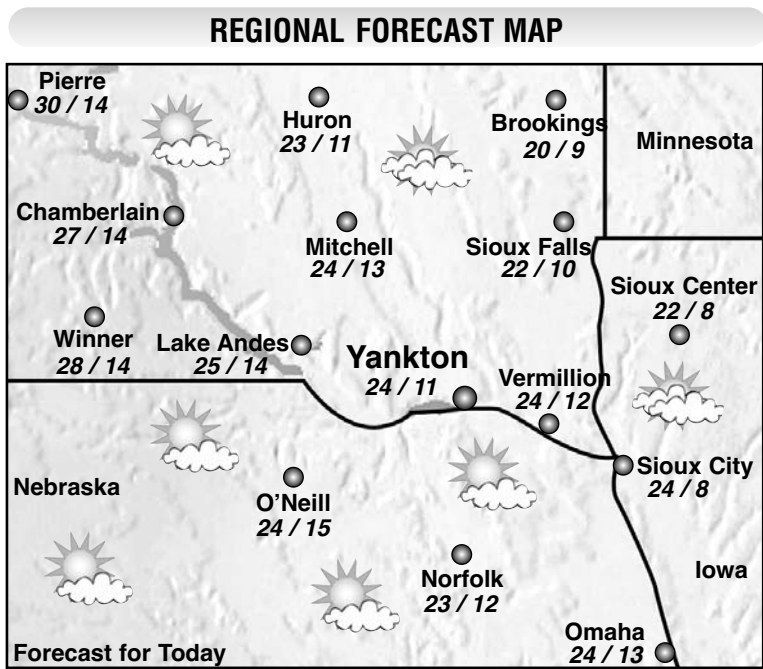

but we have had a lot of drifting." Because the family must handle the expense of the snow removal, the decision is weighed carefully. "You can't go in with big machinery to clear the snow out, because of monuments and marker stakes," Auch said. "We give the families an estimate on what we think it will cost to move the snow and how much time it will take. From there, the family decides if they want to spend the money or not. If the family decides they don't want the added expense of the snow removal, we postpone the burial."

This has not been an issue in Yankton's cemeteries, according to Kevin Opsahl of Opsahl-Kostel Funeral Home. However, it did not surprise him to hear of it occurring in some rural sites. Jeanne Goglin of Goglin Funeral Homes in Goglin and Tyndal said postponing burials is not unique to this winter, for it arises anytime there is a season with a lot of snow. But this is the first year in many years in which it has been a real issue. "Postponement is decided on a case-by-case situation," she said. "In a small town like Scotland, people usually know what is going on. In the case of a recent postponement) it was an expected death. People from the city let us know even before the death that they didn't think they could get to the (plot) location. Snow can be removed from anywhere: You can do anything if you spend enough money. But, then it is a convenience issue, as well. Everyone will be walking down a little path, at some point the family will just decide to come back and do the burial at a later point." Once the family makes the decision, the next consideration is storing the body until spring. "If you are going to have burial ... you will either have the burial of a body or burial of ashes," Goglin said. "(In terms of storage), ashes are not a problem, of course. With bodies, for the most part they are embalmed. When they are embalmed, it is not permanent preservation, but it is fairly good. Then they just need to be stored in a cool place. Between embalming and storage, it is not a problem." A funeral is an opportunity for a family to have closure with a loved one, so the postponement of the burial can be a hardship that will extend the healing time. But Auch noted with cremation becoming more common, that simplifies a lot of things. Moving forward into spring, he expects there will be more snow, and with the snow will come more postponements. And when that snow will clear and the ground will be dry enough for burial is anyone's guess.
