

Farmers' Market Resources/Assistance Workshop Feb. 27

CROFTON, Neb. — The "Farmers' Market Moms" project, administered by Northeast Nebraska Resource, Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council, Inc., is hosting a Farmers' Market Resources and Assistance Workshop on Saturday, Feb. 27, running from 12:30-4 p.m. at the Corps of Discovery Welcome Center located three miles south of Yankton on Highway 81 in Cedar County, Neb.

This workshop will help new and experienced farmers' market vendors and managers prepare for the upcoming season. It will provide information on what makes a successful farmer's market, how to communicate with customers, funding opportunities for local markets, how to develop a community garden and details about the Buy Fresh, Buy Local food campaign. The

information will be particularly helpful to beginning gardeners who are considering becoming a farmers' market vendor during the upcoming season.

Headlining this event are featured speakers Billene Nemec and Pat Garrity.

Nemec managed the Haymarket in Lincoln, Neb., for 14 years, and now chairs the Nebraska Buy Fresh, Buy Local program. Nemec is an experienced farmers' market and local food advocate, presenting workshops around the region on sustaining a farmers' market in local communities.

Garrity founded Garrity's Prairie Gardens near Mission Hill with his wife Jan in the 1980s. He was a regular vendor at the Floyd Boulevard Market in Sioux City and took leadership of that market in 2006. Today, he coordinates the Buy Fresh, Buy Local program

in South Dakota.

This program is hosted by the Farmers' Market Moms project, aimed at gaining new customers and vendors for local farmers' markets, assisting in promoting farmers' markets and promoting family gardening in Nebraska and South Dakota through training, education and health awareness. The project is administered by Northeast Nebraska RC&D in Plainview, Nebraska and is supported through a grant by the Farmers' Market Promotion Program (FMPP), through the Agricultural Marketing Service at USDA.

Campers Can Soon Reserve For Memorial Day

PIERRE — South Dakota state park campers can make reservations for Memorial Day weekend, beginning Feb. 27, for Friday, May 28 arrivals.

"Memorial Day weekend is very busy in all the parks," said state Division of Parks and Recreation Director Doug Hofer. "Campers should plan ahead to reserve their favorite camping spots."

A three-night stay is required during holiday weekends at all state parks except Custer State Park. Reservations are currently being accepted for the entire camping season for campsites in Custer State Park and lodges in all state parks and recreation areas.

Reservations can be made online at www.campsd.com or by calling 1-800-710-CAMP (2267). The telephone reservation center is open 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Central Time). Online reservations may be made 24 hours a day, though campsites do not become available until 7 a.m. on the first day of the 90-day window. There is a \$7.70 per site non-refundable reservation fee, which does not apply to South Dakota residents. Daily or annual park entrance licenses are required of all vehicles entering the parks. Entrance fees are in addition to camping fees.

"If you anonymously write something on the site and it's defamatory, the person you defame must have recourse in finding out who you are," Hamiel said.

The bill would have required operators of Internet sites to keep logs that would provide the identification and location of those who post comments without giving their true names. They would have been compelled to provide that information only in response to a court order in a libel lawsuit.

Hamiel and other lawmakers said a federal law protects operators of Internet sites from liability in lawsuits dealing with defamation.

Pat Powers of Brookings, operator of the South Dakota War College blog, said the government should not force bloggers to keep

information on those who post comments because that could discourage people from debating political ideas. The bill also could have forced children to keep records to identify those who visit their blogs, he said.

"Much of the concern is this is a government mandate to collect the information of people who come on your Web site," Powers said. "We're not China. We expect a little freer discourse than that."

Steve Sibson of Mitchell, operator of a blog called Sibby Online, said he supported the bill because it would protect anonymous free

speech while holding accountable those who commit libel.

Dave Bordewyk of the South Dakota Newspaper Association spoke against the bill. The state's 11 daily newspapers generally allow readers to comment anonymously on news stories, but the papers block those comments that are profane, contain threats or are libelous, he said.

Bob Miller, a lobbyist for South Dakota Funeral Directors, said

funeral homes also do not want to collect Internet addresses to identify those who post anonymous messages of sympathy when someone dies.
