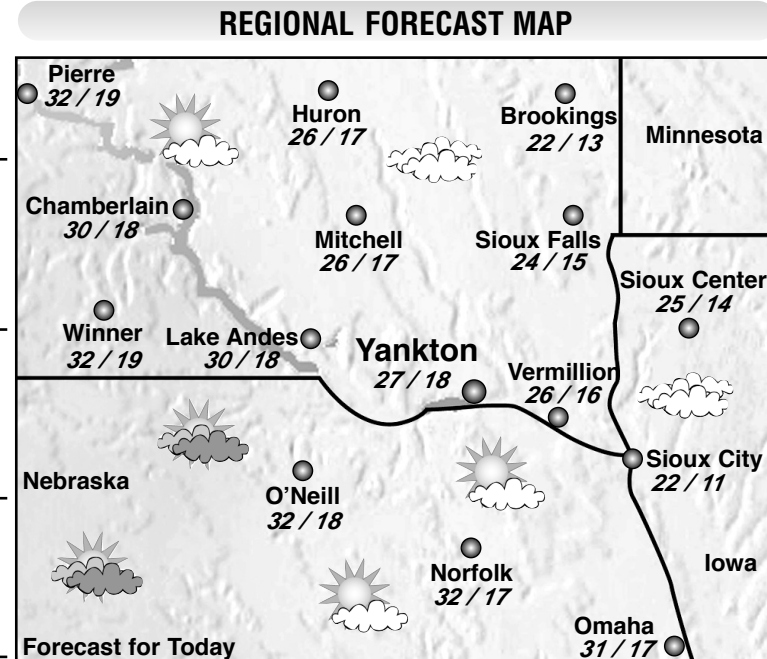

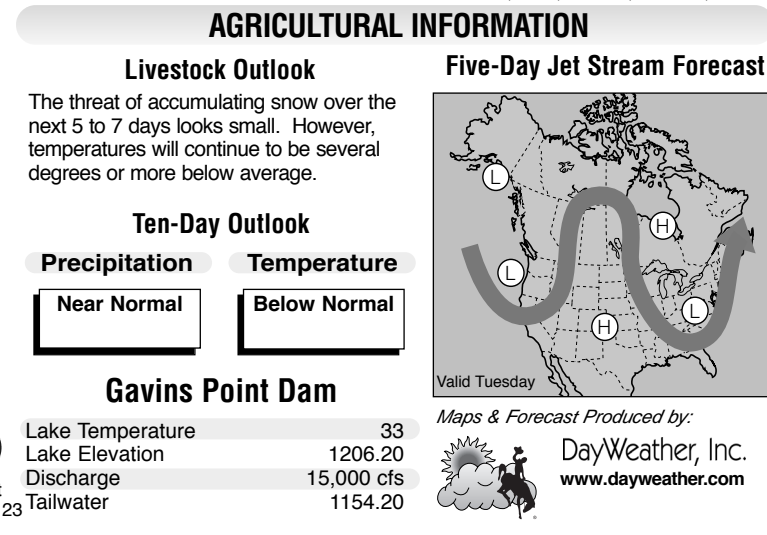

YHS Group Seeks To Help, Benefit 'South Dakota's Haiti'

Other than Haiti, life expectancy on Pine Ridge is the lowest in the Western Hemisphere. Conditions are so poor that the infant mortality rate is five times higher than the national average. The Yankton High School Student Council is teaming up with the National Honor Society to help with a project from USD that will benefit Pine Ridge, one of the poorest counties in the nation.

Pine Ridge is an Indian Reservation located in western South Dakota. Not only is it consistently ranked as one of the poorest counties in the state, but it is ranked as one of the poorest counties in the entire nation. Nearly 80 percent of the residents are unemployed and 49 per-

cent live below the federal poverty level. Within Shannon County, in which the reservation resides, the average per capita income is \$6,286.

The project, known as the Remember Project, aims to help the county by sending goods and supplies, as well as promote awareness of the growing poverty issue.

Allison Struck, a YHS alumni attending the University of South Dakota, has asked the Yankton High School Student Council and National Honor Society to help out.

Throughout the week of March 1, students will bring items that are in need at Pine Ridge. These include canned fruits and vegetables, cleaning supplies, school supplies, and other essential items.

In order to promote the stu-

dents and faculty's participation, the homerooms have been split apart according to which hallway they reside in. Whichever hallway brings the most items earns a breakfast supplied by Student Council and National Honor Society.

The students invite community members to help out any way they can. Non-perishable items and cash donations can be brought to the front office throughout the week of March 1. The Student Council and National Honor Society has helped out with the project in the past. Although they raised sufficient supplies, Pine Ridge requires more help due to the harsh winter and the struggling economy. A rural Scotland man was killed in a vehicle accident early Thursday morning, according to the Yankton County Sheriff's Office. David Larry Bierle, 54, was ejected from his 2005 Chevrolet Trail Blazer when it rolled into a field. The accident, which was reported at 7:30 a.m., occurred on 295th Street near 428th Avenue in the northwest part of Yankton County. The sheriff's office believes the accident had occurred during the early morning hours.

Extensive damage was done to the vehicle, and Bierle was pronounced dead at the scene.

The accident is being investigated by the sheriff's office and the Yankton County Coroner's Office. The Lesterville and Scotland Fire and Rescue departments, the Scotland Police Department and Yankton County EMS were also at the scene.
