

NOTICE OF HEARING TO REVIEW FUTURE USE WATER PERMIT NOS. 448-3 and 2042-3

Notice is given that the Water Management Board will review Future Use Permit Nos. 448-3 and 2042-3 held by the City of Sioux Falls, c/o Greg Anderson, Water Superintendent, 2100 N Minnesota Ave, Sioux Falls SD 57104 for progress made in the development of the water reserved by the Permit and future plans for development of the water reserved by the permits.

Permit No. 448-3 was approved in 1957 and currently reserves 3,842 acre-feet from groundwater (Big Sioux-Sioux Falls Aquifer) located in Sections 4,5,8,9,16,17,20 and 21, T102N-R49W and Sections 16, 17, 20, 21, 28,29, 32 and 33, T103N-R49W for municipal use.

Permit No. 2042-3 was approved in 1974 and currently reserves 28,236 acre-feet from the Missouri River with the point of diversion to be located between points in Section 21-T104N-R71W (Brule County) and a point in Section 34-T93N-R54W (Yankton County) for municipal use

Pursuant to SDCL 46-2A-2 the Chief Engineer of the Water Rights Program recommends that Permit No. 448-3 REMAIN in EFFECT for 3,842 acre-feet annually and No. 2042-3 REMAIN in EFFECT for 28,236 acre-feet annually because 1) the reserved water may be developed, 2) there is need for the reserved water 3) the proposed use will be a beneficial use and 4) it is in the public interest.

The Water Management Board will conduct the hearing to review Future Use Permit Nos. 448-3 and 2042-3 at 10:00 am on March 7, 2012 at the Floyd Mathew Training Center, Joe Foss Building, 523 E Capitol, Pierre SD.

The recommendation of the Chief Engineer is not final or binding upon the Board and the Board is authorized to 1) allow the permits to remain in effect, 2) amend the permits by adding qualifications, 3) cancel the permits for no development or no planned future development, or 4) take no action after it reaches a conclusion based upon facts presented at the public hearing. Any interested person who may be affected by a Board decision and who intends to participate in the hearing before the Board and present evidence or cross-examine witnesses according to SDCL 1-26, must file a written petition with BOTH the permit owner and the Chief Engineer by February 27, 2012. The Chief Engineer's address is "Water Rights Program", Joe Foss Building, 523 E Capitol Ave, Pierre SD 57501 (605 773-3352) and the permit holders mailing address is given above. The petition may be informal, but it must include a statement describing the petitioners interest in the future use permits, the reasons for petitioner's opposition to or support of continuing the future use permits, and the signature and mailing address of the petitioner or his legal counsel if legal counsel is obtained. The permit owner need not file a petition.

The hearing to review Future Use Permit Nos. 448-3 and 2042-3 will be conducted pursuant to the provisions of SDCL 46-1-14, 46-2-5, 46-2-9, 46-2-11, 46-5-38.1; Board Rules ARSD 74:02:01:25.01 thru 74:02:01:25.03 and contested case procedures contained in SDCL 1-26.

This hearing may be an adversarial proceeding. The permit owner or any person, after filing a petition, has the right to be present or to be represented by a lawyer. These and other due process rights will be forfeited if they are not exercised. Decisions of the Board may be appealed to the Circuit Court and State Supreme Court as provided by law.

Any person wishing a copy of the Chief Engineer's recommendation, further information on this permits, to assure access to the hearing by the handicapped or obtain an interpreter for the hearing impaired may contact Eric Gronlund, Water Rights Program, (605 773-3352) by February 27, 2012. The time of the hearing will be automatically delayed for at least 20 days upon written request of the permit owner or any person who has filed a petition to oppose or support continuance of the Future Use Permits. Mitchell Surges Past Yankton

MITCHELL — After a quick start and a solid first half the Yankton Bucks had an upset on their mind as they trailed the Mitchell Kernels, the second-ranked team in Class AA, by only three points at half-time.

The Kernels then came out and quieted any of the upset possibilities by outscoring the Bucks 17-4 in the third quarter. Yankton shot 1-13 from the field in the third quarter. From that point Mitchell continued to pour the points in and came out with a 57-38 victory at the Mitchell Corn Palace.

Yankton began the game by scoring the first five points with a Connor Fitzsimmons three and a Jackson Seitzinger lay-in. The rest of the half was played evenly with neither team gaining much control over the other. Mitchell pulled ahead 17-10, but a Seitzinger three and a Bryan Youngberg jumper kept the Bucks right in the contest.

The main difference in the first half was Mitchell's ability to hit their free throws while Yankton did not. Yankton shot 4-9 from the line while the Kernels were 9-12.

"I thought we played great in the first half," Yankton head coach Randy Gross said. "We could have had a lead at halftime if we just would have made our free throws."

After the halftime intermission Yankton fell apart. In their first six possessions of the half Yankton had two turnovers and four missed

shots. Mitchell, on the other hand, scored seven straight points to extend their lead to ten points. After a Bucks timeout Bryan Youngberg hit a deep three-pointer, but it was the only shot from the field Yankton would make all quarter and Mitchell ran the lead up to 16 before the end of the third.

"We came out in the third quarter with the ball and a chance to

cut the lead to one point or even tie it," Gross said. "But we throw the ball out-of-bounds on a set play and they come down and score. From there everything snowballed on us."

Yankton switched to a full court press in the fourth quarter, but the Kernel offense was too potent and Mitchell extended their lead to 22 points before the benches were cleared to allow some younger players to get some varsity minutes. A Michael Rucker three-pointer for Yankton was the final basket scored as Mitchell outscored Yankton by 19 points on the night, 57-38.

"It was a tale of two halves," Gross said. "We got down in the third quarter and began forcing things on offense, which then hurt our defense."

Jackson Seitzinger led Yankton with 12 points and Bryan Youngberg ended with nine points. Yankton outrebounded the taller Kernels 32-22 on the night. Mitchell's roster featured six players who were 6-4 or taller, while Yankton only had one such player. "We rebounded very well," Gross said. "Our defensive rebounding kept them from scoring second-chance points."

Mitchell was led by Tucker Volesky's 15 points and Matt Henriksen had 13 points. The Kernels only turned the ball over seven times compared to Yankton's 11

turnovers. The loss drops Yankton to 2-13 overall and 1-9 in the Eastern South Dakota Conference, Mitchell improves to 15-2 overall and 9-2 in the ESD.

Yankton will now travel to Aberdeen Central on Friday to face the Golden Eagles, who upset Pierre last night to bring their season record to 6-9 overall.

In sub-varsity action Yankton swept all four contests. The junior varsity Bucks beat Mitchell 53-43. Troy Hunhoff ended with 16 points and Drew Konopasek had 10 points.

The Bucks sophomores improved to 11-2 on the year with a 55-22 victory over Mitchell. Yankton led 29-6 at halftime. Tanner Termansen had 13 points for Yankton. The Yankton freshman "A" players won 38-29, with Brady Hale scoring 10 points. The "B" team doubled-up the Kernels, 34-17. Nick Raab led the Bucks with 11 points.

Fighting Sioux Backers: Name Will Go To Vote

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Is it the return of the Fighting Sioux? Supporters of the University of North Dakota's nickname turned in about 16,000 signatures Tuesday night to cap a petition drive to force a statewide vote on a moniker the NCAA says is insulting to American Indians.

Campaign organizers said they had gathered far more than the 13,452 signatures needed to put a question before voters in June. Secretary of State Al Jaeger planned to count the signatures Wednesday.

If Jaeger determines organizers have enough signatures, he said the petitions alone would be enough to temporarily revive a law that requires UND teams to be known as the Fighting Sioux.

The name and an American Indian head logo have already been scrubbed from university websites and removed from some school
