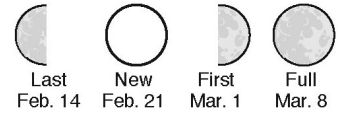

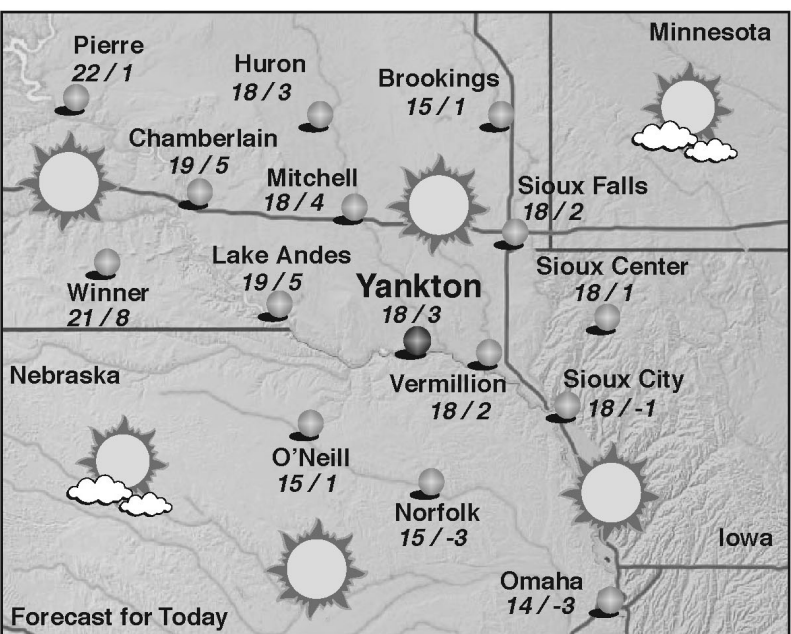

and watching the children he counseled grow up into adults, Kathol said.

Kathol said the subject of Werner's "real" retirement became a running joke between the two of them.

"He would come into the parish office on Mondays to check in," she said. "He would have a cup of coffee, check the obituaries and then say, 'I suppose I should retire.' I said, 'Monsignor, if you retire, I retire.' He would look at me and say, 'You can't do that.' Then I would say, 'I guess you can't, either.'"

"I'm not sure where that leaves me right now, because as of Monday, he will definitely have retired," Kathol said as her voice swelled with emotion.

Jim Wintz, of the Wintz Funeral Home in Hartington, also knew Werner as a sort of extended family member. Werner baptized all of Wintz's children and was on hand for many other family occasions.

"He was a very humble and kind man, and he was always anxious to minister to anyone who would come to him," Wintz said. "After he retired, I know there were many people who sought out Monsignor for advice and the sacrament of reconciliation at his home. He was always willing to share his time with anyone."

While running his funeral home business, Wintz would see first-hand how devoted Werner was to his calling.

"He was very dedicated to serving God and the people he was asked to take care of," Wintz said. "He always felt that was a great privilege and honor given to him by God."

Now, Wintz will have the job of helping Werner into his final resting place.

"That's an honor for our family to be trusted by Monsignor himself to provide those services for him," he said. "We'll be able to take care of him as he took care of so many of

our family members."

The Rev. Jeffery Loseke, the current pastor of Holy Trinity, is in Rome and will not be on hand to say good-bye to Werner Monday.

In a letter to parishioners, Loseke said he visited Werner before departing for the Vatican.

"In that conversation, I promised him that I would celebrate Mass for his intention at the altar over the tomb of Blessed John Paul II in St. Peter's on Friday, Feb. 10," he wrote. "While I am saddened that I will be unable to make it back to the United States for his funeral, I am profoundly humbled by the fact that I will be able to stand at the altar of a saint in the Vatican Basilica and offer to God the soul of one of His faithful priests, my brother and friend, Cyril Werner. Monsignor always tried to serve me and the needs of the parish to the best of his ability. How pleased I am to be able to offer him this act of priestly service for his eternal salvation."

"When I said good-bye to Monsignor last weekend, I told him, 'I'll see you later, Monsignor.' He responded with his usual response: 'I hope so.' Those words ring truer in my memory now than ever before. 'I hope so.' Indeed, this is the faith of the Church, this is our faith. Our blessed hope is that we will be reunited with Monsignor Werner and all our beloved dead in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ."

A Facebook group, "Msgr. Cyril Werner — A LEGACY," was started upon his death. Many have shared memories and photos of Werner, a man who helped shape generations of Hartington residents.

Many still have not forgotten the monsignor's words: "God is good. Always."

A Mass of Christian Burial for Werner is at 9:30 a.m. Monday at Holy Trinity Catholic Church, Hartington, with the Most Rev. George J. Lucas, Archbishop of Omaha, officiating. Burial will be at the St. Michael's Cemetery, Hartington.

Visitation begins at 3 p.m. Sunday at the church with a rosary recited at 4 p.m. by the Knights of Columbus and a Vigil service at 7 p.m. by the Rev. Michael W. Grewe.
