

Bucks Struggle During Regular Season Play



The struggles are continuing for the 2-13 Yankton Bucks who cannot finish games of late. Yankton has been playing well against all opponents, but one of two things seem to be preventing the wins: either the team has a bad half or an error occurs during crunch time.

Spectators have yet to see a full game out of the Bucks, but if that were to happen, things might get interesting.

"We've been playing hard, but haven't had the bounces go our way. If we do, I don't see why we can't get hot here during our last few games," Jackson Seitzinger stated.

Seitzinger has had the hot hand of late, being the lead scorer in most of the contests so far.

The Bucks picked up their second victory of the year against Rapid City Central. Yankton drove 365 miles to Rapid to play the Cobblers. The final score was in Yankton's favor, 52-31.

The game against the Cobblers was a total team effort, in which everyone got to see some time on varsity. "It was fun to see what it was like to play some varsity minutes," junior Zach Benjamin said.

Yankton scoring was led by Bryan Youngberg who had fifteen points. After the win against the Cobblers, Yankton went on the road again to play a Sioux Falls foe, O'Gorman . The Knights took the game 42-33 with Yankton staying in the action until the final period when Yankton only scored a total of six points. Jackson Seitzinger led the Bucks with eleven points overall.

The last time Roosevelt came to Yankton, the Bucks defeated the Riders and Cody Larson who now plays as a Florida Gator. Now, two years later, it would seem the Bucks had the Riders beat on the stat sheet. Still, Roosevelt won by two, 59-57. Roosevelt junior, Tyler Howard, had twenty-eight points and a last second bank shot to send the Rough Riders home with a victory.

Yankton senior, Connor Fitzsimmons, said, "We played them tough, just another time when the small things didn't go our way. Basketball is a game about winning the small things.³

Jackson Seitzinger led Yankton once again by dropping twentysix points. Bryan Youngberg had five assists.

The Bucks took the floor for their next game against an ESD squad, the Brandon Valley Lynx. Another dagger to the heart would describe this one.

The Bucks played Brandon closely until the fourth where they took the lead; but yet again, the small things would set them back. The Lynx won the contest 57-55.

Yankton then headed to Mitchell to face rival Kernels at the Corn Palace. Mitchell won in dominant fashion, 57-38. Their lengthy and quick offense was too much for Yankton to handle. The Bucks had a rough time shooting the ball, shooting only 28% from the field. Seitzinger had twelve points on the board and Youngberg had nine.

Yankton has two games until district, regional and state action starts. Yankton will play Pierre at home on February 17 and then face Huron at home on the 21st to complete regular season play. District play begins on February 28th followed by regional play on March 6th with state to follow in mid March.

Not a week goes by that isn't tough for the Yankton Girls Basketball Team, and this past week was no different.

The Gazelles started the stretch facing off against the Mitchell Kernels last Tuesday night at the Summit Activities Center.

Yankton battled until the end, but despite home court advantage, it was not enough to defeat the number one-ranked team, as they fell 62 to 52 for their fifth loss of the season.

"We were in it the whole time, and we played hard until the end, but there were just plays we should have finished and defensive rebounds we should have had. Those are what cost us the game," senior Emily Fedders explained.

There was not much time for the Gazelles to prepare for their next matchup, played against the O'Gorman Knights just two days later.

The tough schedule and two previous losses were no impediment for Yankton, as they defeated the Knights 52-43.

It became a game of fouls and free throws down the stretch, and fortunately, the Gazelles stayed strong enough to hold their lead, going 11-27 at the line.

"We're definitely lucky that we had a big enough lead to hold on until the end. Our free throw percentage was not what it should have been, and it's something we're going to work on for the future," Fedders said.

As if those two games were not enough, Yankton then had to face the defending state champion, Brandon Valley.

The game was huge, considering the fact that Brandon Valley was ranked number four and Yankton number five and both teams are part of the Eastern South Dakota Conference.

Participants chosen to play for the Northern Plains Hockey camp, play on the University of North Dakota campus in the Ralph Englestad Arena, which can be considered the nicest rink in America. The cost of the arena was \$100,000,000. The arena has two rinks, one which is regulation size and the other rink which is Olympic size.

"We were in North Dakota for a week; for the first couple of days we would do drills, morning and night. The last three days were when they broke us up in the four teams," Johnson explained.
