Man Is Sentenced In Cedar County Incest Case

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A 38year-year old man convicted of sexual assault and incest in northeast Nebraska's Cedar County has been sentenced to prison.

The man was convicted in December on two counts of first-degree sexual assault and two counts of incest.

The Nebraska attorney general's office says the man was sentenced on Monday to 25 to 30 vears in prison on each of sexual assault charges and 5 to 10 years on each of the incest charges. The sentences are to be served concurrently.

The man was accused of sexually assaulting a child over a 10year period beginning when the
