The keynote speaker for the event was Yankton native Alice Dendinger, who said she was so impressed with how much the women of the community, specifically the two winners, have done for the community.

Dendinger, who has more than 25 years of experience in the field of Human Resource Management and Organizational Development, said that speaking in her hometown has allowed her to cross off one of her "must-do" accomplishments, calling it a "dream come true."

Her topic for the presentation was "Is There An 'It' You Don't Get?" It's a fact of life she said everyone can work on is to identify how they interact with others.

"In searching for that blind spot we all have — if we worked on it and what other people see — I

think we would all have a better impact and the community would be a better place," she said, saying the winners have excelled at working for others.

During her speech, she challenged those in attendance to work to be tremendous.

"Wouldn't it be amazing if we would all truly listen instead of hear? If we would seek and assume that everyone has a positive intent?" she said.

She challenged those at the ceremony to vow to forgive each day and learn to use the word "love" more often. She added that if they couldn't say the word "love," they should try to learn to want for others what they want for themselves by simply asking one question.
