

75 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, February 23, 1937

- Citing incidents where intoxicated persons have called at her office and demanded assistance, Mrs. Nell Roskopf, county relief director for Cedar county, Nebraska, has issued a ban against relief money being spent for booze. Classing gambling under the same heading as drinking or other use-less extravagance, relief officials here announced that persons known to be drinking or gambling will be dropped from relief rolls and will not be given re-settlement grants.
- The South Dakota supreme court upheld today a \$2,000 judgment granted C. E. Lundquist in Union county circuit court against the First National Bank of Bersford. Lundquist charged fraud and deceit in a mortgage transaction. The high court found the evidence sufficient to support the verdict.

50 YEARS AGO

Friday, February 23, 1962


- People of the Yankton area breathed a little easier today as the blizzard predicted for Thursday night failed to materialize, but they were looking upon this morning's brisk snow-fall with bated breath. The forecast for the southeast section of South Dakota called for occasional light snow today, becoming partly cloudy tonight and Saturday. However, as people are well aware, light snow predictions often turn into blockbuster blizzards.
- As was expected, Freeman's un-defeated Fliers and Tabor's tough Cardinals came through the semi-finals of the District 26 Class "B" tournament with little trouble in Springfield last night. Those two clubs will meet in the championship tilt tonight. (Freeman overpowered Tabor, 60-39.)

25 YEARS AGO

Monday, February 23, 1987

- Lotteries aren't trouble-free, but they generally make money for the 22 states that operate them, according to lottery officials. The profits depend on how many people are playing the games. South Dakota is among five states thinking about starting lotteries this year. The Legislature is debating two bills that differ somewhat in how the lottery would be run.
- Single farmers, organizing to fight loneliness, held their first national convention this weekend to spread the word that they are not as isolated or alone as they may have feared. "People, in days gone by, accepted this as the way they had to live," said Marcella Spindler, president of the 8-month-old Singles in Agriculture, a group that claims 300 members and a mailing list of 4,000 single people with farm backgrounds.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for March delivery rose 11.50 cents to \$6.4450 a bushel; March corn rose 8.75 cents to \$6.3825 a bushel; March oats fell 1.25 cent to \$3.1925 a bushel; while March soybeans rose 1.25 cent to \$12.7225 a bushel.
Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
April live cattle rose 0.03 cent to \$1.3115 a pound; March feeder cattle fell 0.18 cent to \$1.5842 a pound; while April lean hogs rose 0.55 cent to 90.32 cents a pound.
